DuPage County at the present time, and is sure to hit Downers Grove, with organized effort behind it at no distant date.

I have no objection to the Y. M. C. A. in its proper place, but I am frank to say that I cannot see a useful mission for it in Downers Grove. All of the objections that apply to a Memorial Club apply to it, and more.

One of our great sins as a people is that we are ever instituting new machinery to do the work that could be taken care of by tools already available. This is a terribly expensive process.

In the first place we will have to come to something of this sort before very long. Our present high school building is over-crowded. This year's senior class numbers 19; present statistics indicate an incoming class next fall of about 75.

A township high school opens up a new source of revenue that does not interfere with the old. There are over 200 such schools in Illinois, practically all of them established in order to get money absolutely essential to a first class high school.

Suppose we should build such a school equipment as we really need, would it not be possible by enlarging its functions a bit and combining with it our other resources to have in this town one of the best equipments for education, the entertainment and the recreation of the young and old to be found anywhere in the state?

Suppose we were to establish, with the building of a Memorial Township High School, a community center idea. I have heard it said that in many communities the schools are the most expensive and least used buildings.

Of course the old High School building would be turned over to the

In the new building all of these things could be provided on a much more complete scale. Public spirited citizens who would be willing to donate towards a memorial club or a Y. M. C. A. might be willing to make it financially possible for the architect to include in his plans some community features that would cost but a fraction of the expense that independent buildings would entail.

Of course there ought to be good athletic equipment, including baseball and football fields, a running track, and tennis courts. These should be available and properly supervised summer as well as spring and fall.
