SHORTAGE OF SHIP DRAFTSMEN

Washington, D. C., Jan. 17, 1917 .--There are not enough ship draftsmen in the United States to do the drafting work needed to carry out the naval and merchant ship-building pro-STORMS AND FOREST TREES grams. Naval appropriations aggregating nearly two billions of dol lars have been made since August

> Coincident with the demand for increased naval work there is an equally urgent call for an increase of merchant ship construction. It is betraying no secret to say that in both branches there is a shortage of tech-

The United States Civil Service the best rooted ones and not those of Commission is endeavoring to relieve the dearth of ship draftsmen by recommending to the heads of colleges and technical schools that senior students in engineering courses be given intensive training in naval architecwind to slide off. 
