G. A. Baker was born at Spafford, Onondago County, New York. He made his home at Oswego, N. Y., until he was 43 years old. Here he engaged in the contracting and building business also being connected with the Kingsford Oswego Corn Starch Co. After coming west lived at Ottawa, III., until himself and family suffered so much with the malaria fever when they moved Moline and then to Davenport, Iowa, where he engaged in the contracting business sometimes employing 100 men or more. Construction work such as banks, churches, business houses and many residents still standing in Oswego, N .Y., testifying to the honesty and thoroughness of his work.

From Davenport the family moved to Cedar Falls, Ia., where Mr. Baker again engaged in the starch business. The corn starch made in this factory was much in demand and sold within one-half cent a pound of the Oswego product.

Leaving the starch business Mr Baker again entered the contracting line at Independence, Ia., where he rebuilded much of the business district that had been swept by a devastating fire. After completing this work he went to Manhattan, Kas., on a small farm where he remained for a short time only, or until convinced that his family could not join him best one we've seen in some time: there. Later he went to Clifton, S. D., and filed on Government land and trees that he had set out.
