WARNING-FILE TAX SCHEDULE

The attention of all is called to

that part of section 28 of the Act of October 3rd, 1917, which reads as fellows: "That all persons, corporations, partners s, including lessees or mortgagors of real or personal property trustees acting in any trust capacity, executors, administrators, receivers, conservators, and employ ers, making payment to another person corporation, partnership, association, or insurance company, of interest, rent, salaries, wages premiuma, annuities, compensation renuneration, emoluments, or other fixed or determinable gains, profits, and in come (other than payments described in sections twenty-six and swenty-sec en), of >40 or more it any taxable year, or in he case of such payment. made by the United States, the officers or employees of the United ha ing information as to such pay ments and required to make returns in regard thereto by the regulations hereinafter provid at for, are hereby authorized and required to render true and accurate return to the Com missioner of Internal Reverue, unde such rules and regulations and in such form and acrae as may be prescrib of by him, with the approval of the Secretary of the Treasury, setting forth the amount of such gains, profits, and income, and the name and address of the recipient of such payment xxx."

The government will know whether or not you have made your income tax return, and will have no alternative but to impose the following penalties upon those who are delinquent.

Penalties. For making false or fradulent return, not exceeding one year's imprisonment, or both, in the discretion of the court, and, in addition 100 per cent of the tax evaded.

For failing to make return on time, not less than \$20 nor more than \$1,000 and, in addition, 50 per cent of the amount of tax due.

For failing to pay tax when due five per cent of the amount unpaid, plus I per cent interest for each full month during which it remains un-

Has Great Specific Gravity. Mercury has the greatest specific gravity of all liquids, but recently another has been discovered which is also so heavy that stones of all kindsgranite, limestone, quarts, etc., float in it. It is saturated aqueous solution of tung stoporate. Its specific gravity is 3.3, whereas that of ordinary rock does not exceed 2.7. Only a few precious stones have a specific gravity greater than that of this liquid, for which reason it is proposed to employ it for the separation of such stones from masses of broken rock.

These are the things we do: I dance and play selections on the piano, and some of the others sing, recite, and stage playlets. We charge two cents for children and five cents for adults. "I also sell postal cards to the neighhers and sell old papers to the rag-

ment is asking the people to save in the 56 weeks from December 3, 1917 to December 31, 1918. This is the extent of the great thrift campaign to raise \$2,000,000,000 in 13 months in the United States, inaugurated by Secre-

tary of the Treasury McAdoo. In the world's richest nation that is a small matter, though \$2,000,000,000 sounds like a large sum. Chicago's bank clearings, for the year just closed, totaled over \$24,000,000,000, On more than one single day, the clearings were larger than the total the whole state is asked to save and invest in War Savings stamps in a year.

There has been some fear expressed, especially among retail merchants, that the War Savings campaign would have a detrimental effect on busipeas, but when it is recalled that the government is asking for but 40 cents a week from each person, this seems groundless. There are the baker, the butcher, the grocer, the dry goods merchant, the hardware merchant, the theaters, the druggists, and dozens of other kinds of business in Illinois. When each person is economizing to the extent of only 40 cents a week, and when the economies are divided among all these different classes of trade, it is plain to be seen that any

effect very severely. Many a man spends a dollar a day or more for his cigars stone. Many a seeman spends many times the amount she is asked to save in a year on perfumes. The candy bills of plenty of children, though only a nickel or a dime is spent at a time, will total in a year the \$29 that the child is sup-
