"Furthermore," continued Mr. Tank, "our present schools, both grade and high are good and will compare favorably with the best in the state." "Our high school is an accredited institution with the colleges of the middle west and graduates can enter these colleges without any examination." "It is wrong, in my opinion, to say we have poor schools, let us rather tell the truth and say we have good schools and that we are going t make them better."
