ENDORSE PLAN FOR TOWNSHIP HIGH SCHOOL

Dear Mr. Staats: It is with much satisfaction that I have been noting the trend of thought on the club house problem veering toward what, it seems to me, is the really practical solution, namely, an extension of the taxing limit to include the surrounding country, which simply means for us to take advantage of our state law to promote the best interests of Downers Grove by erecting a community high school. As you know, I have enjoyed the privilege of calling on a large number of the High Schools of Illinois—both city and township and I can say unqualifiedly that the latter (pardon the slang) "has it all over" the former. In the first place, there are many more who are concerned in the work of "the grades" than in that of the high school, and hence, as Mr. Spicer, the Assistant Principal of Joliet Town-

of the work of the high school." In other words, in order to function in its highest sense the high school of today—and especially in these days of reconstruction, readjustment should cater to the adult needs of our community life as well as to that of education of its youth.

The greatest war in history will soon be a past event, but the evident determination of all national as shown in the Peace Conference, is that this last great sacrifice to old Mars shall not have been made in vain. I am hopeful, therefore, that our own home town and country shall take an advanced stand on this question—one worthy of our returning boys in khaki and blue, indeed a memorial truly worth while.

And why pray, would not a new high school, built in the interests of the enrichment of our community life, pay? The plain fact of experience is that—it would be a wise investment all around!
