



The case is made of hardwood, with a glass door that will effectively preserve the cards, 151 in number.

Each man who is in the service has a card of gold with black letters containing his name and the company to which he belongs. These cards are tacked on a black background. Above the case are draped two silk flags, Our Country's Flag, for which these brave boys have given up their homes and entered the service that we may continue to live in that Freedom of

The accident happened last week Thursday and on Saturday a telegram was received here telling of the serious nature of the injury and summoning Mr. and Mrs. Beidelman. After they had started on their journey a second telegram arrived stating that Clyde had passed away.

Funeral services with military honors were held on Thursday afternoon at 2:00 o'clock at the Methodist Episcopal church. The body lying in state at the church from 10:30 a. m. to 1:00 o'clock p. m. on Thursday.
