THIS IS WORTH TRYING

Wenona Farmer Tells Threshermen How to Save a Bushel of Wheat to the Acre.

Lyon Karr, an observing farmer of Wenona, Ill., writes the following letter to the Committee on Food Production and Conservation of the State Council of Defense concerning the waste of wheat in threshing:

"I have observed that there is much preventable waste of wheat at threshing time, especially around the threshing machine. If the tarpaulin used by threshermen to cover their machines at night is spread on the ground in front of the machine and at the sides where the sheaves are unloaded, enough wheat will be saved each day to pay for the tarpaulin. I put my automobile cover on a wagon in 1915, and the wheat that it caught during the unloading was a good peck, and I saw fully as much more wasted between the wagon and the machine. Just a little care would have saved fifty bushels of wheat off sixty acres."
