

PROCEEDINGS OF BOARD OF SUPERVISORS

Proceedings of the Board of Supervisors of DuPage County, at an adjourned meeting held at the Court House in Wheaton on Thursday the 20th day of June, A. D. 1918, at 10 o'clock a. m., pursuant to adjournment.

Meeting called to order with Chairman Boger presiding.

On roll call, all members present. Minutes of last preceding meeting read and declared approved.

All bills and communications on file read and the claims referred to the proper committees.

On motion of Supervisor Hammerschmidt, the Clerk was authorized to issue a County Warrant for \$10.00 in favor of W. S. Binns, Treasurer of Supervisors, Commissioners and Co. Clerks and Probate Clerks' Association for dues for said Association for the year 1918.

The following resolution on State Aid Roads was read and on motion of Supervisor Hammerschmidt was declared approved and adopted:

Final Resolution of County Board. Resolved, By the County Board of DuPage County, that section of public highway described as follows:

Beginning at a point on the public highway designated as proposed State Aid Route No. 1 said point being Sta. 63100, a point on State Aid route No. 1, DuPage County, approximately 1400 feet west of the S. E. corner of Sec. 13, Winfield Township, and extending thence along said route in a westerly direction for a distance of 10,000 feet more or less, of which 10,000 feet are to be improved, to be known as Section G-H, as initiated by the preliminary resolution of this Board, passed Sept. 11, 1917, be improved as a State Aid Road in accordance with the plans and specifications as prepared by the Chief Highway Engineer, and that there have been appropriated from funds in the hands of the County Treasurer, the sum of Twenty-nine Thousand, one hundred and fourteen and 50/100 Dollars, (\$29,114.50) of which \$11,021.00 is to meet the allotment for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1918, and \$18,093.50, an additional appropriation by the county or so much thereof as may be necessary to defray the County's portion of the cost of said improvement; and the County Clerk is hereby directed to transmit to the Department of Public Works and Buildings, Division of Highways, a certified copy of this resolution, which shall constitute final notice.

The action of the County Board being in accordance with sections 22 and 24 of Article IV of "An Act to Revise to Law in Relation to Roads and Bridges," approved June 27, 1912, and all amendments thereto.

Further resolved, that upon receipt of approved estimate by the Department of Public Works and Buildings the County Clerk be authorized to draw orders on the County Treasurer payable to the contractor in payment for the County's portion of said improvement.

On motion of Supervisor Hammerschmidt, the County Clerk was instructed to procure necessary record for keeping a Roll of Honor of DuPage County Boys in Service in the present war.

On motion of Supervisor Hammerschmidt, the Board took recess for thirty minutes.

On re-convening the following report on Committees on Fees and Salaries was on motion of Supervisor Hammerschmidt declared approved:

ALL MUST BE LICENSED

Dealers in Eggs and Poultry, no Matter How Small Must Comply with Regulations.

Country store poultry dealers are required to have licenses no matter how small their dealings in eggs and poultry, the Food Administration announces.

The President's proclamation of May 14 requiring licensing of "Operators of poultry and egg packing plants" has been misunderstood by many small dealers, it is declared. Under the classification, anyone who sells poultry or eggs in any other way than at retail to the consumer, regardless of the amount of business done must be licensed. And most small dealers do sell to commission men from time to time.

In order to comply with the law they must fill out blanks obtained from the United States Food Administration and have licenses issued.

To Prevent Mildew.

The careful housekeeper is often greatly troubled and perplexed by rust and mildew formations caused by damp closets. This state of affairs can be easily remedied if an earthenware bowl or a deep plate full of quicklime is placed in the closet. The lime absorbs the moisture, sweetening and disinfecting the damp corners. Rodents and insects that are likely to congregate in such places greatly dislike the odor of the lime. When the lime becomes staked it should be thrown away and a fresh supply substituted.—Popular Science Monthly.

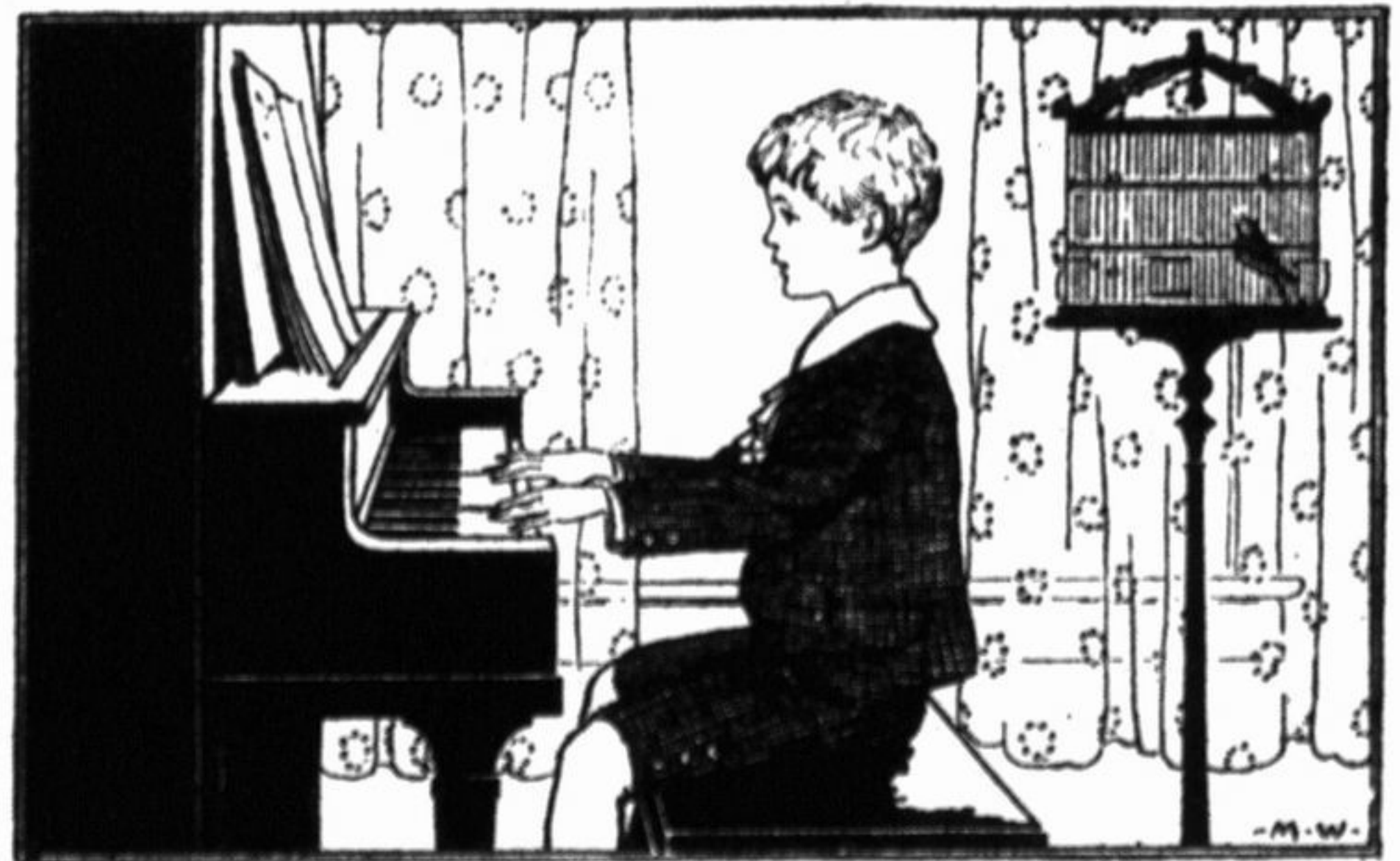
Midgets—Jenkins lined to Henderson near second, Timke was thrown out by Drissler and Mochel whiffed. 0 hit, 0 run, 0 error.
