

A CHALLENGE TO AMERICAN WOMEN


A splendid challenge is sent out to the young womanhood of the country. from the ranks of which are being recrufted 25,000 nurses called for by the Government to help in the woman's nd of the work of bringing the war to an honorable and victorious end. The word comes from the committee on nursing of the general medical board of the Council of National Defense, and is as follows:

"Nursing demands a good deal, but it also brings its own rewards and satisfactions. There is, first of all, the solid satisfaction of knowing that you are doing something that is practical and constructive and of seeing actual, tangible results of your work. Like the soldier, you will have to learn to obey orders promptly and cheerfully and to subordinate your own selfish and personal interests to the general good. You will have to be alert and ready to an swer any call of duty and you will not be able to drop out when things are unpleasant, or to shove your responsi bilities on others. But there is always the spur of human interest to carry you over the difficult parts, and the consciousness of human need which raises the hardest work above the plane of drudgery. There may be physical fatigue sometimes, but there is no boredom in nursing. Florence Nightingale said long ago that of all the women she knew, nurses were the happiest-'the most thankful for their lives'-and she would probably say the same thing today."
