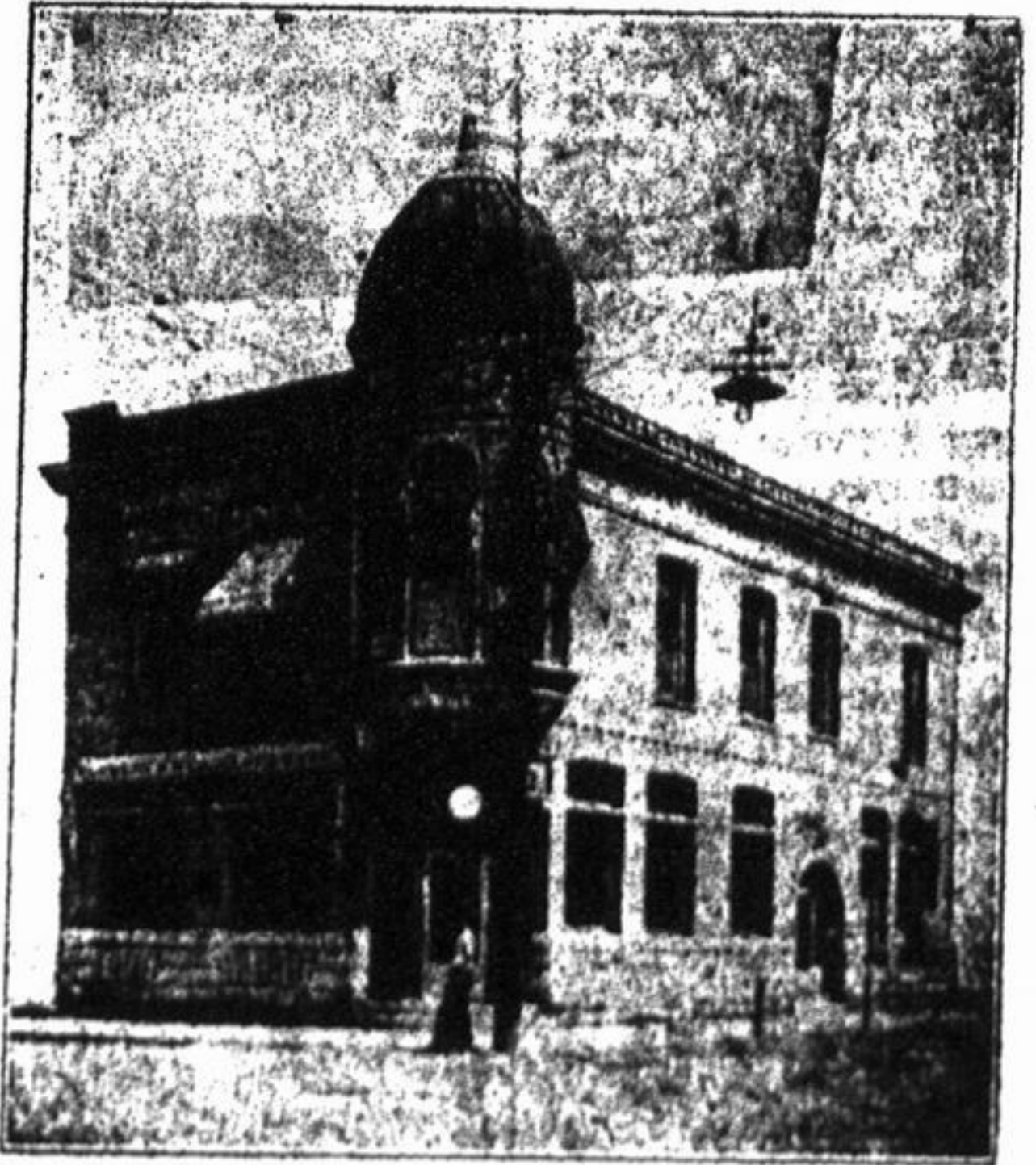

Harry Edgar McAllister was born at Sturgeon Bay, Wis. July 2, 1897. He received his education in the common and high schools of Three Rivers, Mich. After graduating from school he worked in the retail branch of Marshall Field & Co. in Chicago to get experience to manage several of the chain of McAllister stores and when he enlisted was in active charge of the store here and at Hinsdale.

A CHALLENGE TO AMERICAN WOMEN

A splendid challenge is sent out to the young womanhood of the country, from the ranks of which are being recruited 25,000 nurses called for by the Government to help in the woman's end of the work of bringing the war to an honorable and victorious end. The word comes from the committee on nursing of the general medical board of the Council of National Defense, and is as follows:

"Nursing demands a good deal, but it also brings its own rewards and satisfactions. There is, first of all, the solid satisfaction of knowing that you are doing something that is practical and constructive and of seeing actual, tangible results of your work. Then there is the joy of good comradeship and fellowship with so many other workers and the intimate contact with human life and all its vital problems. This absorbing world of the hospital with its wide range of new experiences is intensely interesting, and offers a field of activity more engrossing and often more full of real adventure than the life of the modern soldier. It opens up new branches of study of fascinating possibilities, and brings out new and often unsuspected powers. The work will need the best ability you can bring to it, and its tests will be tests of accomplishments—not of book knowledge only. You will need something of the heroic spirit—the spirit of endurance and self-sacrifice which is sending so many of our

men into posts of danger and incredible difficulty. Like the soldier, you will have to learn to obey orders promptly and cheerfully and to subordinate your own selfish and personal interests to the general good. You will have to be alert and ready to answer any call of duty and you will not be able to drop out when things are unpleasant, or to shove your responsibilities on others. But there is always the spur of human interest to carry you over the difficult parts, and the consciousness of human need which raises the hardest work above the plane of drudgery. There may be physical fatigue sometimes, but there is no boredom in nursing. Florence Nightingale said long ago that of all the women she knew, nurses were the happiest—the most thankful for their lives—and she would probably say the same thing today."

Recruiting stations for this army of young women between the ages of 19 and 35 years are established all over the country. There is a station here under the direction of the local unit of the Woman's Committee of the State Council of Defense, and all inquiries may be answered there, and information received as to the expenses (which are borne by the training school to which the nurse goes), the period of time required and other matters. Those enlisting will become members of the United States Nurse Reserve.
