OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS BOARD OF SUPERVISORS

Proceedings of the board of Supervisors of Du Page County, Illinois, at a special meeting held at the Court House, in Wheaton, on the 12th day of August, A. D. 1918, at 10 o'clock A. M., pursuant to the call of chair.

Meeting called to order with Chairman Bogor presiding.
On roll call all members present.

Minutes of last preceding meeting read and declared approved.

All bills and communications on file read and the claims referred to the proper committees.

On motion of Supervisor Hamerschmidt the following resolution on Good Roads was declared approved and adopted.

Whereas there is a great and growing need for better improved highways throughout the great State of Illinois, and

Whereas there will be before the people of the State at the general election next November the question of borrowing \$60,000,000.00 and using bonds therefor for the purpose of building a system of permanent hard roads reaching every county seat in the State, and

Whereas, the cost thereof will be paid entirely from the automobile license fund, and

Whereas, Governor Lowden assures us that construction of said system of roads will not be undertaken until the close of the war and a large part of the construction of said system of improved highways will be in money paid for labor in constructing same thereby giving employment to local laborers, and

Whereas, the proposition to be approved by the people must receive a majority of all the votes cast for members of the General Assembly at said election, therefor be it

Resolved, by the Du Page County Illinois Board of Supervisors in session at Wheaton, Illinois, August 12, 1918, that we earnestly favor the building of said system of improved roads and urgently request every voter to go to the polls at the general election next November and vote "yes" on said bond proposition.

On motion of Supervisor Fix the following report of the Finance Committee and the semi-annual reports of the County officers were declared approved and made a matter of record. To the Chairman and Members of the Board of Supervisors of Du Page County, Illinois.

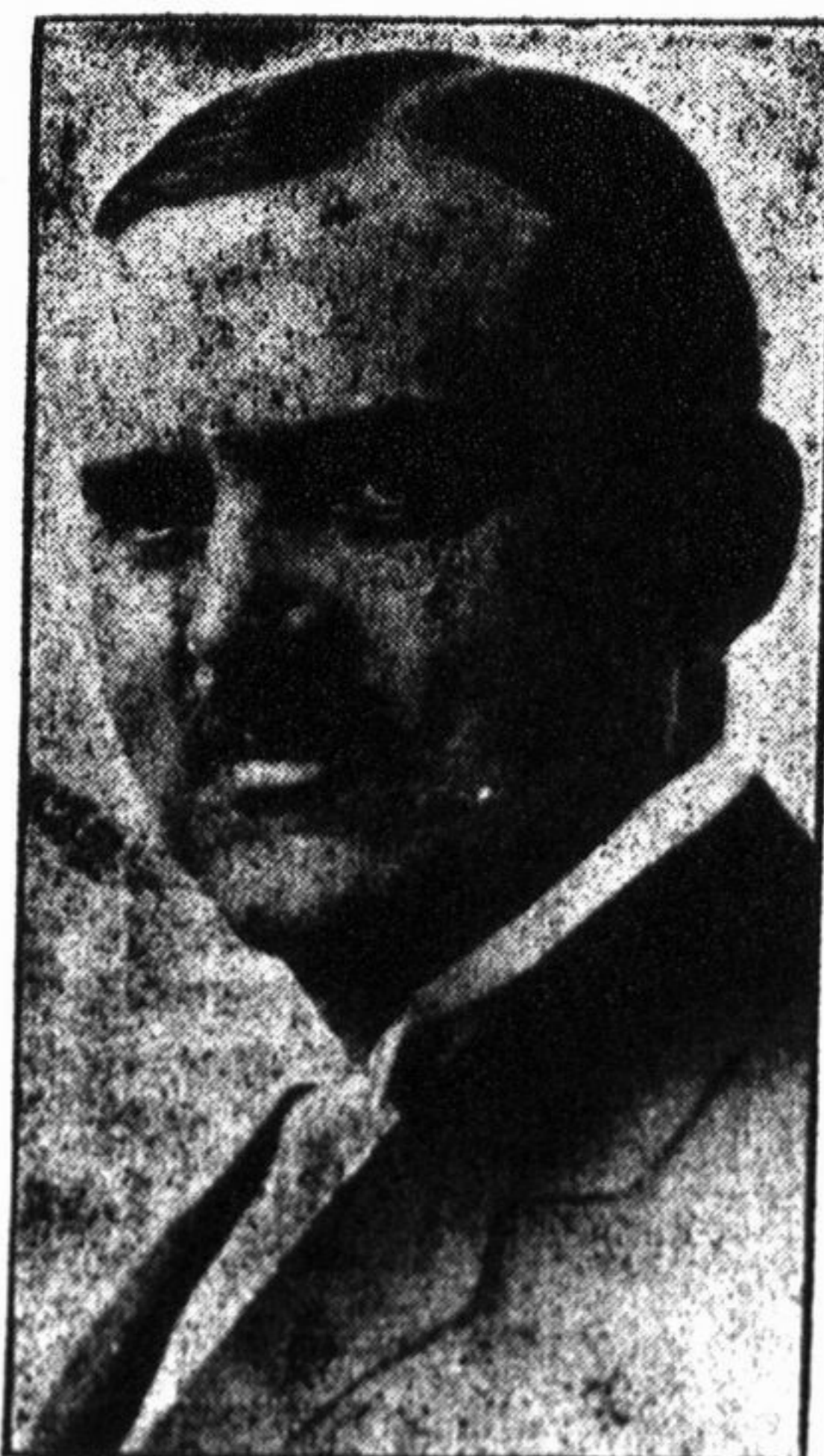
