

Order Your Coal Now! Are You an Ant or a Grasshopper?

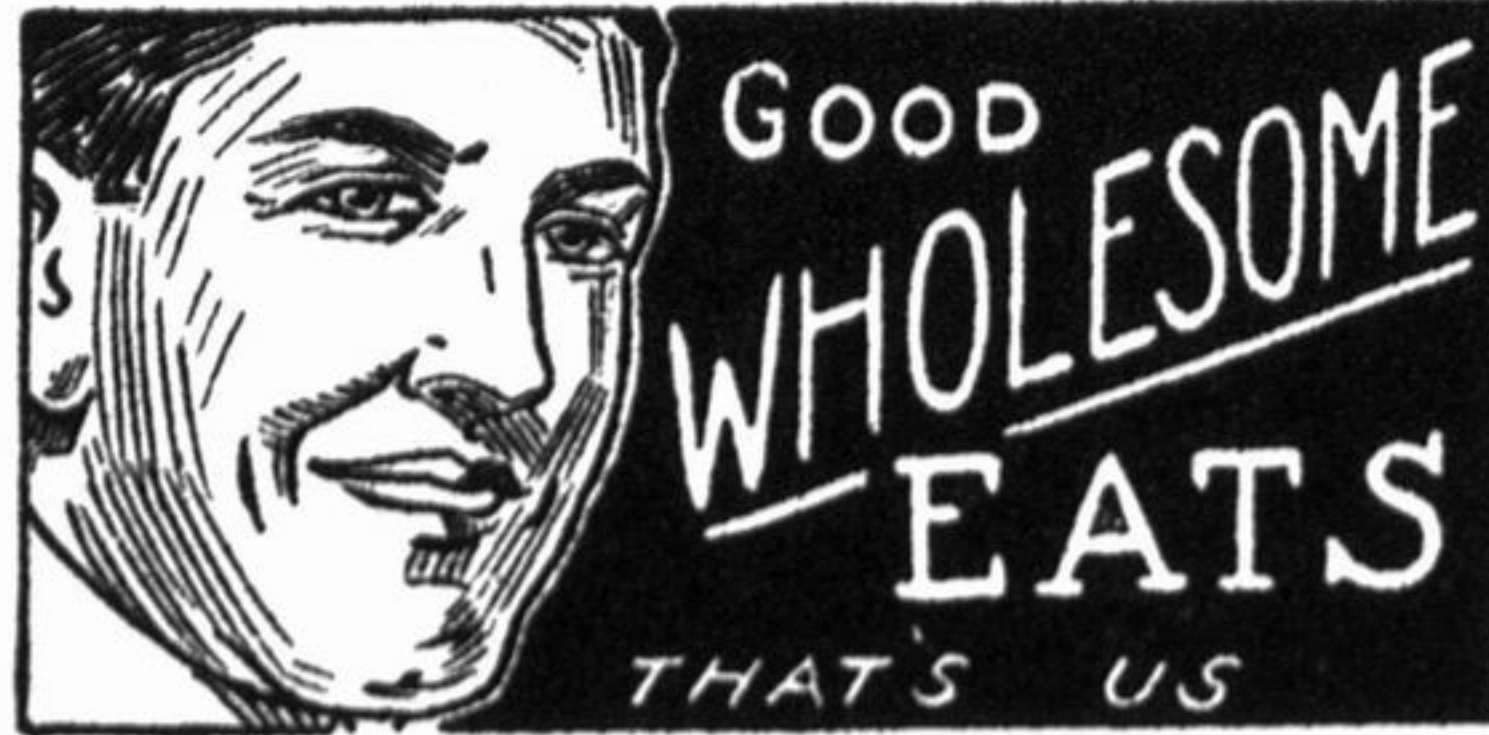
