Women's Committee To Make Campaign Throughout The State In Behalf Of Thrift

Since the war began, women in many communities have started their movements by pledging themselves to do without hats, dresses, ice cream, and an endless variety of luxuries.

The Women's Committee of the State Council of Defense has now started a thrift movement to "do without" but with the difference that a young man from one of the colleges particular person "doing without" there had written to his parents.
