## ROSE M. BUNNING PASSED AWAY LAST SATURDAY

Mourned By Numerous Friends And Carried To Rest By Loving Hands

After walking for many days in paths she loved, in paths made bright for others by her kindly words, her thoughtful deeds and her sweet presence, life here on earth ended for Rose Marie Bunning last Saturday night.

Her passing, preface though it was by days of suffering, came suddenly and scarcely a home in the village but was touched by sorrow for her going, for Rose, Our Rose had won a place in many hearts.

Her life perhaps was uneventful and the chronicle of her years contained no strange adventure, but still

years when she was made an assistant in the village postoffice where her efficient service won the admiration and respect of all. For nearly five years she continued her labors for the public and was the mainstay of the office, through her term of service. When she relinquished her position less than a half a year ago great regret was expressed on every hand.

The ailment which caused her death first manifested itself about five months ago, but until within a few weeks she did not suffer.

Every aid which medical science could invoke was given but without avail. Death came to her in St. Luke's hospital on the eve of an operation. Less than an hour before the end she had talked calmly and courageously with several girlhood friends who visited her and before their leaving had fallen asleep. Her passing was mercifully peaceful.

Funeral services were held Wednesday morning at St. Joseph's church of which she was a faithful con-



those years from childhood on were crowded with kind, loving memories with unbounded love for those near her, with helpfulness to all who knew her and she left a memory of faithful effort, of rare patience, of pure unselfish motives and of loyal Christian faith.

She lived in Downers Grove from childhood. Born November 30th, 1882, on a farm at Lacc a few miles south of the village, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas L. Bunning, she moved to the village with her parents when seven years old, and lived her life in the Bunning homestead in Gilbert avenue.

Successively she passed through all the school grades and on completing her high school course in 1901, went to work in the Burlington office where she remained for eleven

years. She was a high school graduate and by Dr. Ernest R. Goodwin. Before the close of the service, Mr. Goodwin spoke words of tribute and appreciation of the life and work of the deceased. "She is not dead," he said, "she sleeps to wake in heaven, and we may think that she, Our Rose, like some fair blooming flower has now gathered for a chaplet and so escaped the storm and cold of winter."

A profusion of floral tributes testified the feeling of her friends. Interment was in the family lot in the Naperville cemetery. The pallbearers were: Ed. Heintz, George Denney, Frank Harper, Frank Rigbee, Lee Boidelman and Dr. Frank L. Smith.

Her parents, her two brothers, Thomas LeRoy and Loren Edmund Bunning and countless friends mourn her departure.
