NEW CONSTITUTION AND HARD ROADS

VOTE YES

The Board of Supervisors, the Good Roads Association and the Automobile Clubs and Business Men's Associations of DuPage County have endorsed this proposition which is to be voted on November 5, 1918.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF DUPAGE

Proceedings of the Board of Supervisors of DuPage County, Illinois, at a special meeting held at the Court House in Wheaton, on Monday the 28th day of October A. D. 1918, at 10 o'clock a. m. pursuant to call of Chair.

Meeting called to order with Chairman Boger presiding.

On roll call, all members present except Supervisors Kennedy and Yackley.

On motion of Supervisor Fix, the following recommendation of salaries of the various County Officers was declared approved and adopted:

On roll call, all present voting Yes. No nays recorded. Absent Supervisors Yackley and Kennedy.

To the Honorable Chairman and Gentlemen of the Board of Supervisors: Your Committee on Finance beg to report that they have considered the matter of Salaries of the County Clerk, County Judge, County Treasurer and Sheriff and recommend that the annual salaries of the respective officers named above be fixed as follows, for the term of four years beginning with the first Monday of December, A. D. 1918:

County Clerk \$2500.00, County Judge \$2400.00, County Treasurer \$2500.00, Sheriff \$2000.00. All of which is respectfully submitted, Wm. Hamerschmidt, Frank Cramer, Finance Committee.

On motion of Supervisor Fix the Chair was authorized to appoint a committee to arrange with the Sheriff for the feeding of the prisoners. The Chair appointed, Supervisors Hamerschmidt, Fix and Miller.

On motion of Supervisor Fix, the Finance Committee were authorized to select an attorney for the County to act in the W. P. Cowen Estate.

On motion of Supervisor Miller the Board adjourned to Call of Chair. A. A. Kuhn, Clerk.

THE INFLUENZA EPIDEMIC IN ILLINOIS

Approximately one million cases of influenza have developed in Illinois during the present epidemic, according to a statement issued here tonight by Dr. C. St. Clair Drake, Director of the State Department of Public Health. This number includes the mild cases as well as those which have proved to be more serious.

Reports received today from 142 cities and towns in all sections of Illinois indicate that the epidemic has passed the crest in the northern part of the state, is approaching what is expected to be its highest point in the central section, while the southern counties may expect a large increase in the number of cases during the next two weeks.

Dr. Drake has added 24 physicians to his field staff. These men are working night and day in the communities to which they have been assigned and received their appointment through the United States Public Health Service.

In several communities in the northern section of the state Dr. Drake announced that the influenza quarantine may be lifted within a few days. As the disease is brought under control and conditions again become normal in other communities, the ban on public meetings will be rescinded although officials of the state health department made it clear that in no case must the quarantine be lifted except on order from the state department of public health.

Local authorities are urged to keep the state department of health advised daily as to the situation in their respective communities, so that the quarantine may be lifted as soon as possible.

A telegraphic survey of the state today, revealed that the epidemic is developing rapidly and with more serious consequences in rural communities. More serious results are reported in the farming sections of the state than in the cities according to the population.

The disease is also making rapid inroads in the mining communities. In these sections the epidemic has been almost explosive in character. In many instances the first few cases reported have been immediately followed by hundreds of others until from twenty-five to seventy-five per cent of the entire population of these centers have been infected.

The State Department of Public Health has not ordered that churches be closed but it urgently recommends that where they remain open during the epidemic that proper ventilation be provided and that persons in the congregation who cough, sneeze or spit, be excluded from the room.

"It will be at least four weeks before Illinois can hope to be over the worst of the present situation," said Dr. Drake today. "However, we will proceed as rapidly as possible to release communities from quarantine as soon as it is safe to do so. In all probabilities the quarantine will be lifted in the northern section of the state before the epidemic has reached its worst in southern Illinois."

COINS FOR ILLINOIS CENTENNIAL CELEBRATION

A number of county centennial organizations have not yet requisitioned the centennial half dollars allotted to them under the pro rata arrangement worked out by the Illinois Centennial Commission. Under the plan announced by Hugh S. Magill, Jr., director of the Centennial Celebration these half dollars must be sold for one dollar, the proceeds going to each county to which the coins are allotted for the defraying of expenses of centennial celebrations or as contributions to the Red Cross.

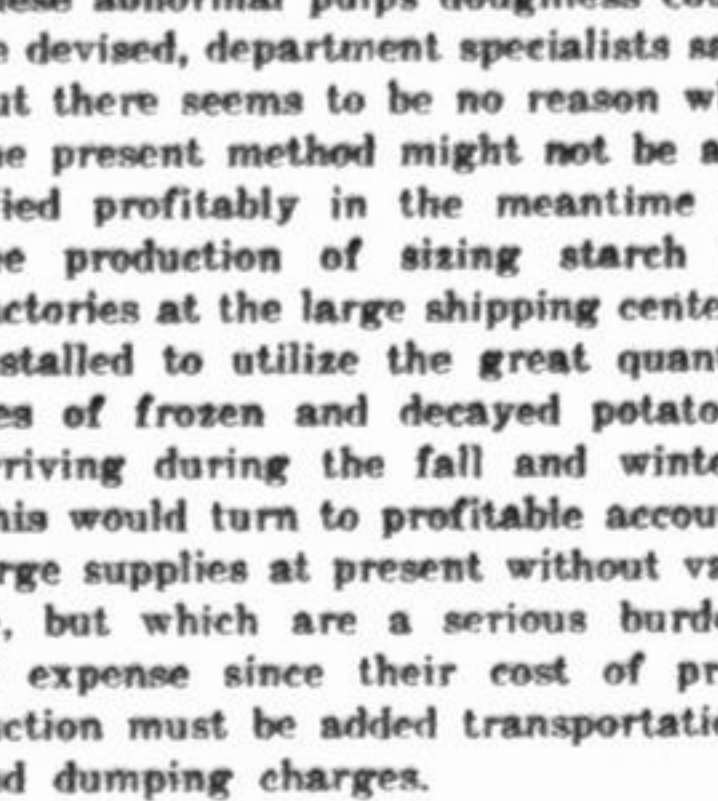
Several county organizations have announced their intention of using the proceeds from the coins to pay their expenses of the December 3 celebration in honor of the centennial of the formal admission of the state into the Union. Others, which have already held their celebrations will donate the proceeds from the sale of the coins to the Red Cross.

The county centennial organization merely remits the face value of the number of coins pro rated to the county. A report must be made to the Centennial Commission of the amount of money realized from the sale of the coins and the use made of it.

A total of one hundred thousand of these coins was turned out by the United States Mint and owing to the limited coinage, coin collectors all over the United States are showing a lively interest in obtaining samples of the issue. The one hundred thousand coins are to be distributed in accordance with the population of each county based upon the 1910 census. Under this arrangement DuPage County is entitled to 557 coins.
