kept running. This may sound like a big job and so it is and is what we have to call doing our bit.

I will try and describe our work and base as best I can. All motor repair parts being used by the U. S. Army in France, including tires pass through our depot.

The buildings are all of modern construction, being built of steel and glass with concrete floors, and let me add, they are not of a two by four size either. I think I am safe in saying that the business section of your city could easily be set under the roof of the various shops and our depot, and we would still have plenty of room to walk around.

I spoke of the Motor Repair Shops being located here and it surely is a sight to see the shape some of the trucks are in that are shipped here. They arrive with two or three wheels missing, the engine gone and most of the body shot away, outside of this they are generally in pretty good shape.

We are living in tents at present, but expect to be in barracks before winter sets in. The days at present are warm but as the sun goes down it begins to grow cool and by morning it is generally not any to warm for comfort, especially about the time the first call for reveille sounds.
