\$100 GIFTS FOR OUR BOYS

Plan for Employers to Show Apprecia tion of Their Men in the Service Is Generally Adopted.

The big clean-up drive for War Savings is on. It is called the "over-the-12-6-3 top" drive. From Chicago to Cairo every township in the state is organized to sell the state's quota of \$125,-000,000 worth of War Savings stamps by December 31.

A survey of the possibilities was made by the Illinois Committee for War Savings, of which Martin A. Ryerson of Chicago is director, and it was found that on December 1 approximmtely \$40,000,000 worth of lilinois' quota remained unsold. In connection with the "Over the Top" drive a brand new idea will insure a merry Christmas to Illinois boys in the army and navy. idea embodies the buying by employers of one \$100 War Savings stamp certificate for each employee in the service. The certificates will be held in trust for the fighters and presented to them upon their return, or to dependent relatives. The cost of

11-29-3 the certificates in December is \$84.60. A large number of big concerns in the state have taken up the proposition and cards telling the beneficiaries of the Christmas gift being held in trust for them have been forwarded to france. The Illinois committee es timates that in this way at least 75,000 soldiers and sailors from IIIInois will have provided for them the nucleus of a permanent savings fund.

Another feature of the big drive is the recommendation that this year every person make part of his or her Christmas gifts in War Savings stamps. There is no attempt to discourage the giving of other useful gifts, but the state committee suggests that War Savings stamps take the place of all useless gifts this year.

Many large concerns, particularly bankers and bond houses, give bonuses for the holidays and this year most of stamps. First installments of salary increases, in some instances, also will. be made with War Savings stemps.
