DOWNERS GROVE PREPARING FOR RED CROSS DRIVE

Efforts Will be Made to Make Residents 100 per Cent Members in Xmas Roll Call.

The first membership drive conducted by the American Red Cross since last Christmas will start here Monday. Downers Grove is behind the average for the country in memberships and this will be changed after the final results of the drive have been announced. This is the policy local workers have in mind on the eve of the drive.

"Christmas Roll Call," what a train of thought that line brings up. There have been roll calls galore during the past year and a half and some of the boys who have been answering "here" when their names were called, somewhere over there, will only answer in a like manner when the roll is called somewhere up yonder. Through all this time of stress the Red Cross has been on the job. Over here and over there, with warm things to wear, cats and smokes, comfort kits and SERVICE. Sixty minutes an hour and twenty-four hours a day have various ramifications of this organization been serving the soldiers and sailors of Uncle Sam. In camps, in railroad stations, on transports, everywhere, have they lent a helping hand to the Yanks and Gogs.

It has been your money through memberships, that has made this possible and it will be your money that will carry it through to a successful completion.

Then again the Red Cross does not confine itself to the fighting men alone. The civil forces of France, Belgium, Italy and Russia and our own United States have all been ministered to by this "Mother of the World."

Everyone in Downers Grove will be asked to take a 1919 membership in the American Red Cross at a cost of one dollar.

The Christmas roll call begins next Sunday and closes on Sunday, December 22nd. The organization with a national membership of 20,000,000 is out to make its roll universal. It wants everyone in the United States to belong.

One in five people in the country now hold memberships. But one in seven in Downers Grove holds a membership. Consequently Downers Grove has been below average on Red Cross membership. In the Christmas Roll Call the village will no doubt come up to its usual standing on all matters of this kind.

The solicitation for memberships will be in the hands of the State Council of Defense organization which has functioned so successfully on the last Liberty Loan Drive and in other war work. The same men who have done this work will cover their territories.

Arrangements for handling the local work have been made by Mayor John F. Kidwell as chairman of the State Council of Defense organization and Mrs. J. D. Gillespie, president of the local branch of the Red Cross. Mrs. Gillespie and others attended the meeting in Chicago Thursday when final instructions on methods and rules were given out.
