DR. HENCH HAD MIRACULOUS ES-CAPE FROM DEATH



I-Election by the disabled man of a course of training.

2-Preliminary training to fit him for a definite occupation. 3-A probationary period of em-

ployment in that occupation. 4-Placement in suitable position. 5-Follow-up work to safeguard his

The government will support the man while training, will pay his tuition, traveling expenses and any other expenses incident to his training, and will give his family the same support which was given during military ser
