Proceedings of the Board of Supervisors of DuPage County, at a special meeting held at the Court House in Wheaton, on Tuesday the 10th day of December, A. D. 1918, pursuant to the following call published in the Wheaton Illinois, November 29, 1918. To A. A. Kuhn, County Clerk and ex-officio Clerk of the Board of Supervisors of DuPage County.

Dear Sir: You are respectfully requested to call the Board of Supervisors together, in special session to convene at the Court House in Wheaton, on Tuesday the 10th day of December A. D. 1918, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, for the purpose of selecting a Grand Jury for the January Term A. D. 1919, of the Circuit Court of DuPage County and to transact such other business as may come before them.

Meeting called to order with chairman Boger presiding.
On roll call, all members present except Supervisors Kirchhoff and Kennedy.

Minutes of last preceding meeting read and declared approved.

All bills and communications on file read and the claims referred to the proper committees.

On motion of Supervisor Miller the Petition for a State Aid Road, as presented by F. J. Bogan, was placed on file and the matter referred to the State Aid Road Committee.

On motion of Supervisor Lies, all necessary changes to be made in the offices of the County Treasurer and County Superintendent of Schools were left with the Court House and Grounds Committee, with power to act.

On motion of Supervisor Hamerschmidt, E. L. Gates, County Superintendent of Highways, is to attend the short course of Civil Engineers to be held at the University of Illinois and the County to defray the expenses.
