A letter from anyone in Congressman Copley's district addressed to Hon. I. C. Copley, M. C., Washington,

D. C., will reach the congressman's office promptly, and an allotment of seeds will be sent in response to requests mailed as long as the supply holds out.

Information just received from Congressman Copley's office is to the effect that he has a supply sufficient for several hundred requests and the seeds will be sent as long as they last, in the order that requests are received.

If you want government seeds, please write the congressman promptly as indicated above.

'EYE FOR EYE' WITH NAZIMOVA AT THE CURTISS

Nazimova, conceded to be the most fascinating and talented actress on the screen will be seen in a thrilling production 'EYE FOR EYE', at the Curtiss Theatre today. This play is a vivid drama of the Orient and the great star will be seen in the role of Hassouna, a girl of the desert.

The picture was taken from the famous play 'L'Occident,' written by the noted Belgian dramatist, Henry Kistemacker, and adapted for the use of the screen by June Mathis and Albert Capellani. Mr. Capellani, who is a distinguished French Director, made the production under the personal supervision of Maxwell Karger.

The story is that of an Arabian girl, fiery and beautiful, who lives with her tribe in a city of tents on the edge of the desert. Duty takes a young French naval officer to their encampment and here he is made prisoner. Hassouna falls in love with him and releases him—later aiding in his escape. When the loss of the prisoner is discovered she confesses her help in his escape and for this act is condemned to death, the Arabs abandoning her to the desert to perish from thirst and starvation.

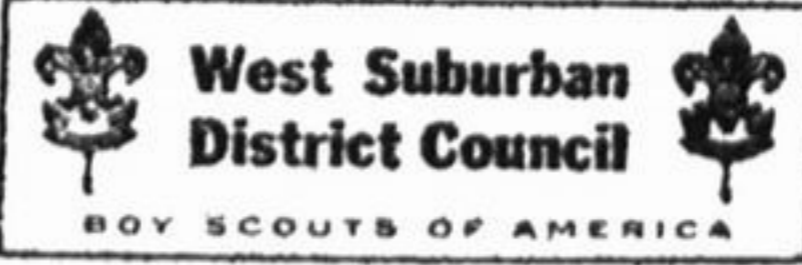
The beautiful girl is rescued but faces a fate worse than death—she is sold to a travelling circus as a dancing girl, and finds herself in the hands of a brutal master.

The story is vital and absorbing, following the life of this passionate and untamed girl of the desert. Later she becomes a member of the family of the man whose life she saved.

and becomes involved in the intrigue which is rife in his family. All the passions of human nature are displayed in this stirring drama of Oriental and Occidental life—love, hate, jealousy, deceit, treachery and revenge—all have their turn in this gripping and amazing play. Nazimova rises to the heights of her supreme emotional art in this glowing drama of the Far East.

The cast which surrounds the distinguished actress was carefully chosen by Mr. Capellani with a view to their real fitness for the several parts they were called to portray. Charles Bryant, the noted English actor, is the leading man of the production and will be seen in the role of Capt. Cadere, the French officer. Donald Gallagher plays the part of Ensign Arnaud and others of the cast are Sally Crute, E. H. Fernandez, John Binhard and Miriam Battista.

The play was translated from the original French by Mrs. Nina Lewton, a sister of Madam Nazimova.

The Boys Scouts of the West Suburban District held a very successful competition on last Saturday evening at Riverside. While all the Troops in the District were invited to participate, four of them were unable to attend. Of the 15 troops that did take part there were 314 members present out of the total membership of 433 scouts. Although this is quite a good many boys to have in one room at a time nevertheless, there were no cases of disorder and the boys clearly showed they knew what was expected of them.

The contest was divided into three parts, the 1st consisted of tying 9 knots and this event was won by Hinsdale Troop No. 1, 2nd place was taken by LaGrange No. 2 and 3rd by Hinsdale No. 2.

There was also an allowance made to each troop for the number of scouts they had represented relative to their total enrollment and also for attendance, good behavior and sportsmanship. In the final score Hinsdale No. 1 secured 109 points; Riverside No. 1, 68; Hinsdale No. 2, and LaGrange No. 2, tied for 3rd with 58; 4th place was secured by Berwyn No. 4.

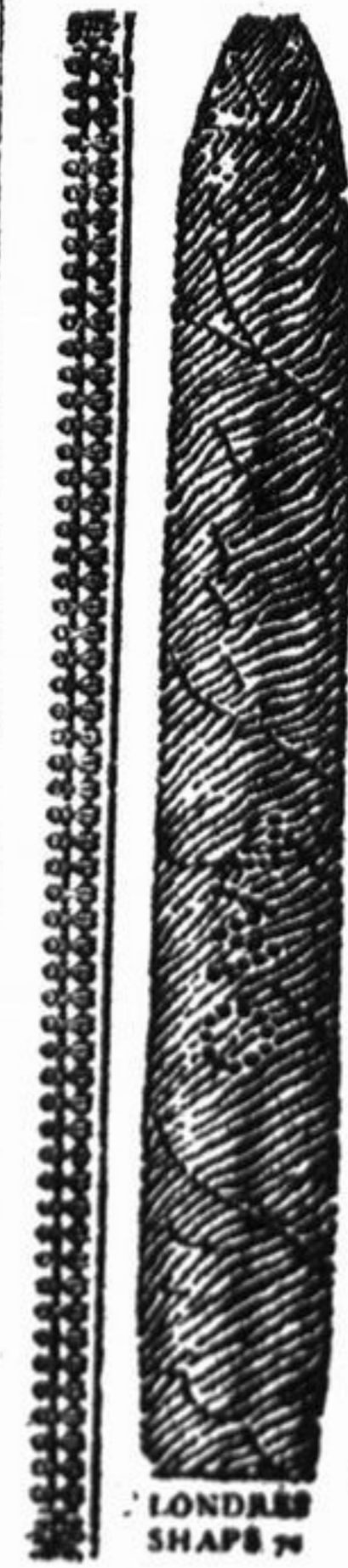

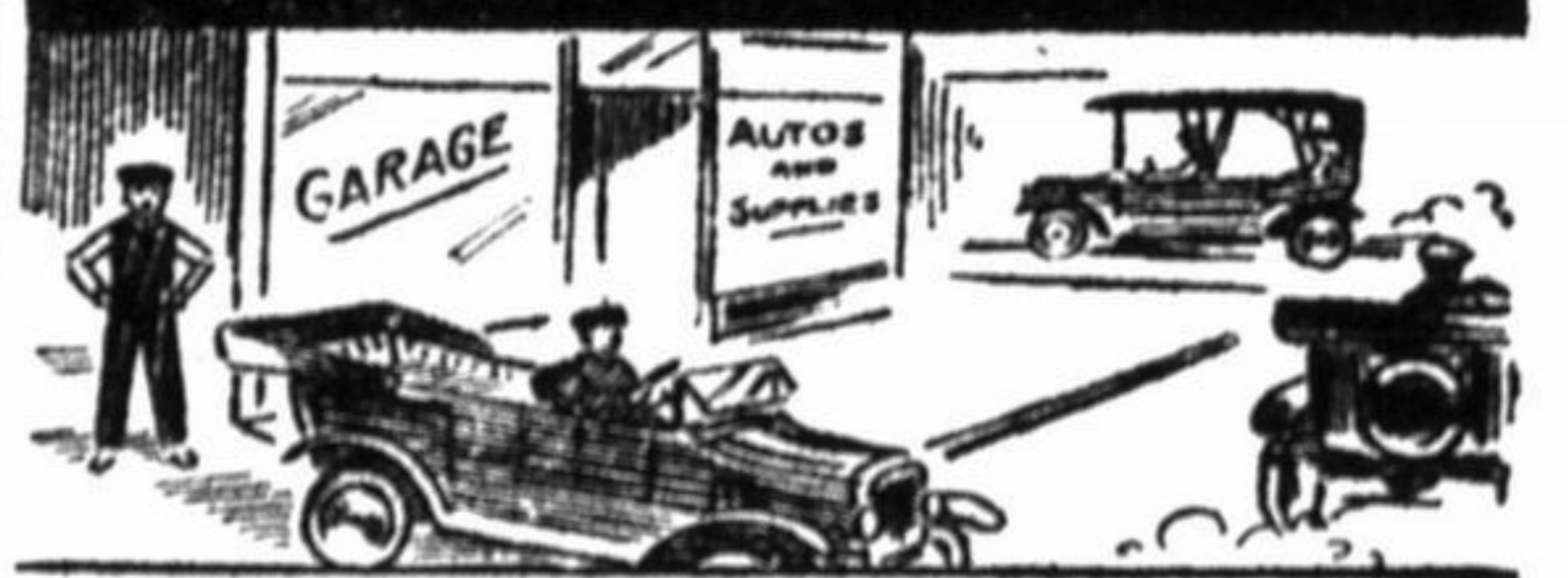
How Detroit spoke to Portland Ore.
