HIGHWAY COMMISSIONERS MAKE PROTEST

The Highway Commissioners of the County met at the County Superintendent of Highway's office and discussed various ways and means of bettering our highways. The most serious proposition that the Commissioners have to deal with is the auto truck. These trucks can spoil more road in one day than can be built in a month.

The following resolution was adopted and should be supported by every taxpayer if we are to have roads and keep them in condition with the money available. If anyone is interested in better roads, cut out this resolution and mail with a personal letter to Mr. James R. Bentley, Mr. Wm. R. McCabe or Mr. R. J. Barr, Springfield, Illinois and urge them to enact such laws as will improve our highway system.

WHEREAS, it is impossible to maintain our highways in a suitable and passable condition with the traffic we now have on them, and

WHEREAS, the cause of the destruction of our highways is the heavy loads carried and the weight of the auto trucks now traveling through the country, and

WHEREAS, no limit is now placed on the weight of said trucks and

WHEREAS, we believe the width of tire has very little effect considering the weight on the road,

THEREFORE, Be It Resolved, that we, the Highway Officials of Du Page County, Illinois, do hereby protest against the destruction of our roads and also that we petition the members of our Legislature to enact such laws that will limit the load allowed upon our dirt, gravel, or macadam highways during the months from September 1st to May 1st to six (6) tons, including weight of auto, and not to exceed ten (10) tons from May 1st to September 1st, and also when the Highway Commissioner deems it advisable to keep heavy travel off the highway he shall have the power to regulate such traffic for the best interest of the roads, regardless of the weight of the vehicles, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that a copy of this resolution be sent to every member of the Legislature urging their immediate action.
