SOLDIERS' FRIEND OBJECTS TO FLAG PRESENTATION

Downers Grove, May 26, 1919. Editor of the Reporter,

On reading your good paper of May 23, I see from it that our little town is going to have a welcome home banquet, and presentation of a war flag, June 4 or 11.

This is what I consider one of the most uncalled for and most unjust celebrations that Downers Grove has ever been asked to participate in.

There were about 293 enlisted and drafted men from our town and about 175 are now home. The balance of them (over 100) are still in camp or overseas serving their country.

One would think that since the 149th had come home that none of the rest of the boys had a right to be considered.

There are Stanley Bacon and John Burek still in the Army of Occupation in Germany, the Gollan boy, the Johnstone boy, Dr. Hartnack and a host of others who are not abroad for their health, or because they like the job.

These hundred boys are just as good soldiers and doing as loyal service as ever the 149th did or could do and they have a right to feel that the home folks are loyal to them.

In justice to these boys the Flag Presentation ought not to be made till they get home.

If this flag was presented a year from next 4th of July (that is July 4th, 1920) it would be time enough and would give every boy a chance to get back home including that brave young fellow, John T. Bryan, of the Marine Corps, who is missing.

The flag can only be presented once and why all this rush, to do it.
