COMMITTEE ON TEACHERS PRESENTED REPORT

May 21st, 1919.

The Board of Education met in Special Session at the Maple Avenue School Building.

The meeting was called on the request of the Committee on Teachers and Schools.

President J. R. Shaffer, presiding.

Members present: Mrs. M. H. Prince, H. G. Butler, W. R. Curtis, H. E. Tank, R. E. Rasseweiler, F. E. Dowe.

The returns of the Special Election on Saturday, May 17th, to vote on the proposition of increasing the tax rate for school purposes from 2 to 4 per cent, showed the following results:

The Committee on Teachers and Schools submit the following recommendations for the school year of 1919-1920:
