**REPORT OF STATE CONVENTION OF WOMANS CLUBS**

The 24th Annual Convention of the Illinois Federation of Womans Clubs was held in Peoria June 3-4-5.

On Monday, June 2, a special train left Chicago at 12:30 noon, carrying some 500 club women from all parts of the state to Peoria, where they were registered and arranged to be in readiness for the opening session of the convention on Tuesday morning at 9 o'clock in Mohammed Temple.

Dr. Gasper Wistar Hiatt, pastor, 1st Congregational Church of Peoria, gave the invocation.

Address of welcome was made by Hon. E. W. Woodruff, Mayor of Peoria responded to by Miss Jessie I. Spafford, State President. Reports of State Officers followed.

Mrs. Frances Wetmore, Supervisor of Teachers for the foreign born, Chicago Board of Education, spoke on the Club Women in Americanization. Mrs. Wetmore believes the teaching of the English language the first step in Americanization.

J. A. James, Ph. D., Dean Graduate School, Northwestern University, spoke on our "Natural Resources." During the course of the lecture he delivered a tribute to former President Roosevelt for his work in conservation.

Mr. W. J. Bogan, Principal Lane Technical High School, Chicago, spoke on "Vocational Education in Illinois." The belief that teachers are born not made, has furnished a plausible excuse for our failure to attempt their training.

Following each of these addresses conferences were held by the departments to which they referred and practical questions and plans were proposed and discussed.

Tuesday evening, Dr. W. A. Evans the noted specialist of Chicago, spoke on "Public Health." Dr. Evans claims the Illinois Federation of Women is responsible for the rapid strides in the check of tubercular conditions in the State.

Wednesday morning the nominations for president, vice-president and recording secretary were made. Mrs. Frank Funk of Bloomington and Mrs. W. H. Hart of Benton, being nominated for President; Mrs. John T. Mason of Aurora, Mrs. Amelia H. Jerome of Chicago and Mrs. J. T. Savage of Carlinville, for vice-president; Mrs. W. K. Northam of Evanston, recording secretary and Mrs. Geo. Plummer of Chicago, Parliamentarian.

Violet Palmer Brown, M. D., Chairman Dept. of Public Health, recommended that each club get in touch with the superintendent of the schools in its vicinity and urge the acceptance of the bureau's health program which includes the following points:
