VILLAGE ORDINANCE

An Ordinance making Appropriations for the Corporate purposes of the Village of Downers Grove, Illinois, for the fiscal year commencing on the first of May, 1919, and ending on the thirtieth day of April, A. D. 1920.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE VILLAGE OF DOWNERS GROVE, ILLINOIS:

Section 1. That the following sums or so much thereof as may be necessary and authorized by law, be and the same are hereby appropriated for the corporate purposes of the Village of Downers Grove, Illinois, to defray all necessary expenses and liabilities of said Village of Downers Grove, Illinois, as hereinafter specified for the fiscal year, commencing on the first day of May 1919 and ending on the 30th day of April, 1920.

Includes Department of Public Affairs, Dept. of Accounts and Finances, Dept. of Public Health and Safety, Police Department, Dept. of Streets and Public Imp., Board of Local Improvements, Sewers (Including Disposal), Plant, Department of Public Property, Operating Water and Light Plant, For repairing and maintaining water and light plant, Water mains and hydrants, Rent and purchase of real estate.

Section 2. That said several sums of money are hereby appropriated from moneys received and to be received by the Village of Downers Grove from all sources.

Section 3. This Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and approval.
