"CHURCH OF THE CLOSED STREET" TO START JULY 6

Ministers of the Five Co-operating

Mr. M. V. Morton and Mr. C. K. Reighill constitute a Music Committee, Mr. Morton chairman.

The Finance Committee shall be composed of the treasurers of the co-operating churches. Miss Mary Diener, temporary chairman.

It was decided that these services shall again be held in the closed street using the entrance to the Congregational Church as a Rostrum.

During the first five Sundays of the union services the pastors from oldest to youngest in point of service in the village will preach the Word in rotation. Furthermore, that the ministers jointly plan for the last four services using as far as possible stereoptican views and evangelistic and educational Missionary services.

Rev. B. H. Fleming was appointed chairman of the Publicity Committee. J. Alfred Nansen, Secretary.

The churches taking part are: Baptist, Methodist, St. Paul's Evangelical First Evangelical and Congregational.

EX-SERVICE MEN WILL HOLD MEET- ING ON JULY 21

Every Local Soldier, Sailor and Marine Urged to Attend Temporary Organization Get-Together.

Downers Grove's ex-soldiers, sailors and marines will meet in the G. A. Hall, above the Puffer Pharmacy, on Monday evening, July 7th.

The purpose of the meeting is to organize a post of the American Legion, that national body of men who served with the colors during the war.

Any man is eligible to this organization who was in the military or naval service of the United States during the period from April 6, 1917 to November 11, 1918, both dates inclusive and all persons who served in the military or naval services of any of the governments associated with the United States during the World War, providing that they were citizens of the United States at the time of their enlistment and who are again citizens at the time of their application for membership.

The organization seeks to safeguard and transmit to posterity the principles of Justice, Freedom and Democracy.

The Legion was first conceived while most of the troops were in France and a meeting of delegates was held in April. A name was chosen and a further meeting called for St. Louis. This was held on May 10, 1919. A large and enthusiastic crowd of delegates met and formed a temporary constitution and set of by-laws. These will be made permanent at a large national meeting held in November. Local branches are springing up and by November the membership will well be on the way to 4,000,000, the mark aimed at.

At the meeting on July 7th temporary officers will be elected to serve until after the big Minneapolis Convention, when they will either be confirmed or a new set elected.

Every Downers Grove and vicinity man who served in uniform during the war, whether his service was in the U. S. Army, Navy, Marine Corps, or in any of the allied countries, may volunteer to serve here or over there if needed to attend. Those in charge of trying to make the Downers Grove post the largest in the country. When in and out Ellinwood are now well organized and there is talk of the country posts getting together.

The time is 7:30 p. m. Monday July 7th and the place is the G. A. Hall.

WAR DEPARTMENT OFFERS CITATION FOR REEMPLOYMENT

WAR DEPARTMENT
Office of the Assistant to the Secretary, Washington, D. C. Staats, Editor, Reporter, Downers Grove, Ill.

My dear Sir:

Doubtless you know our work of getting positions for discharged soldiers and sailors has gotten away to a good start. All over the United States the War Department is securing the hearty cooperation of all the welfare services, chambers of commerce, labor unions, employers associations, and many national, state and civic bodies, all of whom are at liberty to use the machinery of the United States Employment Service towards hooking up the discharged man of the Army and Navy with a good job.

We have also had the patriotic assistance of employers, corporations, firms, and individuals, in the matter of reinstating their old men in the jobs they held before they went to war. I may add that between 70 and 80 per cent of our honorably discharged soldiers and sailors have the offer of their pre-war jobs. The hero of today is not to become the hobo of tomorrow.

In return for this the War Departments have prepared a handsome citation which is issued to all those everybody who formerly worked with them and left to serve in the Army or Navy during the great war. This citation carries with it permission for the holder to display on his firm's service flag the shield of the United States as a symbol that he will fulfill his obligations to the men who went to the defense of the country at the time of its peril.

As yet I do not think that employers generally throughout the United States know about this citation and I am writing to you to ask if you will give this letter space in your valuable column in order that the manufacturers, merchants, professional men, and employees generally in your community may know that they are entitled to this interesting official document.

The citation is signed by the Secretary of War, the Secretary of the Navy, and myself, assistant to the Secretary of War. It is handsomely mounted and engrossed with the name of the recipient. There are no costs to it. All we ask is that the employee write an application for a citation, stating that he will re-employ his old service men and address me in care of the War Department, Washington, D. C.

The newspapers of many cities at the outbreak of the war published the names of those patriotic employers who agreed to retain their places for their men who enlisted or were drafted. It occurs to me now that it would be a very fine and patriotic act if at this time, with victory won, the newspapers publish the names of those firms and individuals in their neighborhood who are taking back honorably discharged service men, whether they agreed to or not when the war began.
