The watering schedule follows: First Ward—Tuesday; Second Ward—Wednesday; Third Ward—Thursday; Fourth Ward—Friday. The water is to be used only between the hours of 7 and 8 in the evening.

In case you do not know the ward in which you live the following will help: The first ward is east of Main St. and south of the "Q". The second ward is west of Main and south of the "Q". The third is west of Main and north of the "Q" and the fourth east of Main and north of the "Q".
