NEW CATHOLIC PASTOR BEGINS WORK IN WHEATON

The Rev. Francis J. Epstein, P. M., began officially Sunday, July 2, the able rectorship of St. Michael's Roman Catholic church at Wheaton. Sunday he was at the church and organized an automobile parade to escort his predecessor, the Rev. Father de la Porte, who resigned after four years of service to his home in Lombard.

Father Epstein is 39 years of age. He was born in Chicago, his parents having lived there for over fifty years. He was the first pastor appointed by Archbishop G. W. Mundelein to organize a new parish, St. Williams, at Wrightwood and Newland avenues, Chicago.

GAME SEASON OPENING DATES ARE CHANGED

Date of opening of the season for the hunting of rabbits has been changed from September 1 to November 1, ending January 31 as heretofore. No ferrets may be used, and the hunter who takes one on a hunting expedition should expect to have it confiscated and killed.

Squirrel season has been advanced a month from August 1 and is now on having opened July 1.

Mourning dove season in September 1 to September 30 and open season for ducks from September 16 to December 31, advancing opening day from September 1, the date heretofore in effect.
