VETERANS OF AMERICAN WARS TO BE FAIR GUESTS State Fair to Old Soldiers Day August 20 and an Elaborate Program is Being Prepared. The Department of Agriculture thru the Division of State Fair of that department, has arranged an elaborate program for Victory and Old Soldiers' Day on Wednesday, August 20, at the State Fair, and it is preparing to show the visiting veterans every consideration. The exercises of the day will be held in the morning on the grounds. John B. Inman, Past Department Commander of the Grand Army of the Republic will call the meeting to order and will introduce Governor Lowden, who will preside. The principle addresses will be delivered by Clarendon E. Adams of Omaha, Commander in Chief of the Grand Army of the Republic; William Jones of New York, Commander in Chief of the United Spanish War Veterans, and either Lieut. Colonel Theodore Roosevelt, Jr. or Captain Archie Roosevelt, representing the World War Veterans. There will be other noted men on the program and excellent music will be provided. In accordance with the proclamation of Governor Lowden, the gates will be open free to all veterans of the three wars during the day. For the purpose of identification at the gate, the bronze button of the Civil War Veterans and the button worn by the United Spanish War Veterans will be recognized at the gate. For the World War Veterans, the uniform or a copy of the discharge papers, or the American Legion, or any other satisfactory evidence of service will be recognized by the gate-man. The fair management is anxious that every veteran may receive the most cordial welcome and that he may suffer no annoyance, and it, therefore, requests visiting veterans to provide themselves with any one of the identification requirements. A special rate of fare and one-half for the round trip will be given on all roads during the fair, August 15-23.
