PEABODY ENTERS RACE FOR SEAT IN U. S. SENATE

Candidacy of Hinsdale Coal Man Announced at Du Page County Democratic Banquet.

Francis S. Peabody of Hinsdale, head of the Peabody Coal Co., and one of the leading coal men of the state will be a candidate on the Democratic ticket for the United States Senate to succeed James Hamilton Lewis. The election will be held in November next year.

Mr. Peabody's candidacy was announced at a dinner given by the Du Page County Democratic Committee Saturday night at the Hotel Sherman. All of the committeemen were present, and substantially all of the recognized leaders of the regular organization in Cook county were there with a sprinkling of leading Democrats from downstate, all belonging to the "regulars." Resolutions of indorsement of Mr. Peabody were adopted by the Du Page county committee.

The same resolutions were also adopted by the other Democrats at the meeting. They were introduced by Henry F. Donovan of Will County and seconded by John A. Logan of Kane county, both members of the state committee, and by Robert M. Sweitzer of Cook county.

Mr. Peabody had no hesitation in declaring his readiness to start for the senatorship. He said he did not have to be driven into the contest; that he has a determined ambition to win both the nomination and the election and that in his way of thinking the opportunity is excellent for a business man to be sent to the United States senate from Illinois.

He said, furthermore, that he believes the times to be propitious for a Democratic candidate to break old time precedents made in electing Republican senators. Incidentally, he returned the usual Democratic compliment to President Wilson's administration and spoke flatteringly of former Senator James Hamilton Lewis, who was not among those present.

Among the Chicago Democrats at the banquet who endorsed Mr. Pea-

body's candidacy were: County Chairman James M. Dailey, County Clerk Robert M. Sweitzer, County Treasurer Harry Gibbons, Henry Stuckart and James T. Igoe.

Mr. Peabody will no doubt win the nomination and is even well enough known downstate to carry the election in the opinion of Du Page County's leading Democrats.
