

ELEVEN INNING CONTEST SUNDAY WON BY LOCALS

Word Game Enjoyed by Many Fans - Hinsdale Took Labor Day Game by 7 to 2 Score.

A game last Sunday featured by good pitching, slugging and many thrills kept a large crowd interested at the local diamond when the American Legion nosed out the White Rocks of Chicago by one run in eleven innings. The score, 13 to 12, would give one the impression that it was a slugging match from start to finish. In spots the five pitchers used, played wonderful ball.

Jorgenson of the locals started on the slab and held the visitors to one hit for six innings. In the seventh and eighth they fouled him, and with the assistance of several boots by his team mates, the White Rocks garnered in much tallies.

At the beginning of the seventh the score stood 6-10 favor Downers. Four runs by the visitors and five by the locals in this hectic inning made it 11-4. This looked like a sure win and several fans left for home.

The unlucky eighth turned the tide as eight tallies were registered in the first half and only one in the second making it a tie twelve all. Here Ehninger was substituted for Jorgenson and in the next three innings following struck out five men.

AMERICAN LEGION HELD FINE MEETING TUESDAY EVE

Plans For Future Activities of Local Post Discussed—Over Sixty Ex-Service Men Were Present

More than sixty ex-service men of Downers Grove were present Tuesday evening at a meeting of Alexander Burns Post, American Legion in the G. A. R. hall. It was, from a standpoint of attendance and action one of the best meetings to date.

After considerable discussion the proposition of the Recreation Association for the Legion to work with them in securing an athletic field, was referred to the athletic committee. This committee will confer with the association and plans will be more fully gone into at this meeting. It was the sense of the members present Tuesday night that every organization in the village interested in any way in athletics should consolidate their efforts in the securing of a suitable field. This field to be for the use of the entire village.

With winter fast approaching the men are anxious to get permanent quarters, not for meetings, but where they can go at any time, day or night, secure in the knowledge that that place is for them. The committee has been instructed to push this work so that if a suitable building can be had it will be ready by the time snow flies.

Several persons have pledged financial help in the furnishing of club rooms and that is lacking now is a place.

The entertainment committee is busy with plans for a dance to be given September 26th. The legion plans to make this the first of a series to be run the coming season so that they and their friends can have some jolly times.

The state convention will be held at Peoria starting October 17th and at the next meeting delegates will be elected to attend this convention.

Peoria is making great plans for the entertainment of Illinois' ex-service men and it is expected that thousands of men who wore the khaki and the blue, besides the delegates will attend this first and important state get together.

The local post now has on its rolls more than eighty members. Interest in the legion is growing by leaps and bounds, not only here but all over the country. The national organization now boasts of more than a half million men and the goal set for November 11 is double this number. Numerically it is the strongest organization which has grown out of the war and it will continue to grow.

WESTERN SPRINGS WON LONG GAME FROM OLYMPICS
