

BOWLING LEAGUE TO START PLAY SEPTEMBER 30TH

Sixty-Five Men Ready for Place on Teams and Only Forty of them Can Be Used.

The first Annual Tournament of the Downers Grove Bowling League will start next Tuesday evening, September 30th and continue until April 23, next year.

Kidwell's Speeders: A. Vix. More than \$400 in prizes have been arranged for including team and individual prizes and never before in the history of local bowling have those who participate and those who watch been so enthused at the beginning of a season.

Officers of the league are: L. E. Bunning, President; W. G. Bollow, Secretary; W. H. Beidelman, Treasurer.

More than \$500 has been spent by Mr. Dicke in getting the alleys in shape for the season. The drives have been planned down, sanded and refinished. New runways and cushions are in; the ball returns are new and the interior has all been redecorated.

Not only the bowlers but men who never before have been interested in the game are now talking about the league. If their 1919-1920 season is a success, and it should be from the fact that sixty-five made application when there was room just for forty.

Information from their schedule folder follows: Special Rules. Any person absent from any team must pay his part toward league which is 30 cents weekly.

No remarks or applause from anyone will be tolerated when any bowler is on run-way of alley, in position of delivering his ball.

Do not talk to the pin-boys, if necessary let the manager do it. All tie games to be rolled off immediately, only one ball by each man is all that is necessary.

No money refunded to anyone dropping out of the league under any circumstances. All games to be rolled on Alleys 1 and 2.

Teams bowl Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday. Entry fee, \$2.00. Expense of the league, 75c per week per man.

Bowlers must bowl 54 games to qualify for individual prizes, which must be 3 of the last 6 games bowled. If team is a man short, 140 pins will be allowed.

Games start at 8:00 p. m. Sharp! Forty-eight hour notice must be given to a team in order to postpone any game. A total of 84 games are to be rolled. No games in league from December 19th to January 6th, on account of several participants spending holidays away from home.

FORMER RESIDENT TELLS START OF PUBLIC LIBRARY

Chicago, September 20th, 1919. Editor Downers Grove Reporter, Downers Grove, Illinois.

Dear Sir: I have been very much interested in the editorials appearing in your paper in regard to the Public Library.

I have before me the original petition that was circulated for signers by the late Mrs. A. P. Daniels. She devoted a great deal of time to promote a Carnegie Library in Downers Grove. She met with a great many obstacles, but she procured all the documents necessary from the Carnegie headquarters. She had several meetings called, they were attended mostly by false friends of Downers Grove who attempted to double-cross her and knocked the proposition in general. With the help of the late Captain Rogers she told certain parties what she thought of them, and it developed the only grievance the opposition had was jealousy.

The above may not interest you, but what I am trying to convey is this—the writer has always been willing to donate his money and services if necessary for any worthy cause in Downers Grove. I have always attempted to treat everybody as near right as they would allow me. I have bought and paid for \$2,000 worth of Liberty Bonds, helped to put Downers Grove over. I have donated to the Red Cross and everything else that was promoted.

The same people who pretend to be better than I go out of their way to accuse me of many things that are ridiculous. I understand that there is quite a few that never lose an opportunity to say that I owe everybody in Downers Grove, that my house is mortgaged, that I have never paid my assessments.

Let me say right here, that if owing of money was capital punishment there would be mighty few in Downers Grove alive.

I am more than pleased to say to you that my house is not mortgaged, I paid my assessments in full some years ago, and I don't know anybody in the world today that I owe one dollar to.

I only mention these things to show you why people who are ready and willing to help a Library feel that it is not appreciated.

I remember well when Mrs. Daniels first suggested a Carnegie Library that the hue cry was the law would not allow taxpayers to be taxed more than so many mills, she said all right and good let us all get together and pay the difference.

Taking the attitude that a banquet or other form of entertainment would be a pleasure for one night only and years they gladly accepted the offer for club quarters would be pleasure for money to help furnish such quarters.

The only "string" attached to the gift was that when the club rooms are opened the village be given a chance at a regular old fashioned house warming. That one evening be set aside when everyone could visit the rooms, inspect them and say howdy to the boys. So with these facts in view the next welcome home will be a jolly one.

There was left in the welcome home fund \$75.00 and to this was added \$425.00 from the Welfare League's treasury making a total of \$500.00 which the boys can have when they are ready for it. To this sum the Rev. Eneas B. Goodwin, in the name of his parish, has added \$25.00 for the furnishing of suitable rooms.

The permanent quarters committee is now looking for a suitable location, and has as one solution the old Congregational church building.
