GREATEST CHARACTER IN FRENCH CRIMINAL HISTORY

Mons. Picard, master society crook and the greatest character in the history of French criminology, is portrayed with splendid fidelity and realism in "A Rogue's Romance," the Earle Williams Picture which will be seen in the Curtiss Theatre on Wednesday, October 1st. Mr. Williams is perfectly at home in the fascinating role, for he is always at his best in crook and detective stories, which lend themselves to his polished and easily confident screen presence, and his work in this picture is strongly suggestive of his memorable triumph in "Arsene Lupin." As Mons. Picard, as the other lesser crooks and finally as a famous detective, Mr. Williams completely mystifies society by the boldness and success of his thefts and as completely baffles the master minds on the Paris detective force. Always suspected, but never caught, he finally turns straight for love of a girl and retires after making amends by thwarting a gigantic stock swindle and saving the life savings of hundreds of poor persons. H. H. Van Loan wrote this swift moving mystery drama especially for Mr. Williams, and the picture was filmed on the West Coast under the direction of James Young. In the supporting cast are Brinsley Shaw, Harry Van Meter, Herbert Standing, Marion Skinner, Kathryn Adams, Maude George, Sid Franklin and Karl Formis.

THE RACING STRAIN

Dicke Theatre, Thursday, Oct. 2. Colonel Cameron, a Kentucky horseman, is fast nearing financial ruin, a victim of a New York wildcat stock manipulator, "Big Jim" DeLuce. The Colonel's daughter, Lucille (Mae Marsh) meets Jim for the first time at a Red Cross lawn fete she gives on her father's estate. He showers her with attention, but she repulses him. At the same event she is introduced to Lieut. Gregory Haines, who, unknown to the Camerons, holds a mortgage on the Cameron home. His attempts to win her affection prove far more successful. As one of the features of the fete Lucille raffles off Southern Pride, the only horse remaining of the Colonel's once famous stable. The filly has sprained a tendon in her last race and the Colonel has abandoned all hope of ever racing her again. Strangely enough, Lucille is winner of the raffle. She is now much in love with Haines and DeLuce is angered. He learns that Haines is the owner of the mortgage and informs the Colonel who tells Lucille. Haines has previously told his lawyer to withhold the name of the man who holds the mortgage. He is ordered from the house by Lucille. He goes North. Into the Cameron stables one day comes Johnny Tweed, an ex-jockey who has become a derelict. He applies to Lucille for work and when told Southern Pride can never race again promises, if he gets a job, he will restore the filly to her old form. Lucille is skeptical, but hires him to treat Southern Pride. Haines learns from friends that the Camerons are in Saratoga and journeys there. At his hotel he overhears DeLuce telling one of his agents that Southern Pride must be "fixed" because of her record workouts, De Luce having entered Torpedo in the same race. Lucille, having suspected a trick of this sort, is at the stables when DeLuce appears to drug Southern Pride. He beats her to the floor and is about to fix the filly when Haines rushes in the Jim low with the butt of his gun. While Haines has DeLuce covered, Lucille forces him to put up \$12,000 against some worthless stock he has unloaded on her father as a wager on the race. An hour later Southern Pride wins the big event and Lucille goes joyously to Haines' arms.

HUNS PERFORMED AIR STUNTS ONLY WHEN DYING, FILM SHOWS

The assertion that German aviators never performed really daring stunts of trick flying was made several days ago by American air veterans who were spectators at a showing of Vitagraph's big picture, "Daring Hearts." This film, presenting a remarkable exhibition of aviation stunts, has just been released. Francis X. Buschman and Beverly Bayne are co-stars in the production.

"The only time a Hun ever did a side slip or a tail spin was when he was shot down and the machine performed by itself," said one of the veteran aces as he watched the film. His comrades echoed the statement. In "Daring Hearts," which will be shown at the Curtiss Theatre on September 27th, there is an episode showing a battle in the air, in which one American aviator attacks five Huns and sends down three of them. As each of the three Hun machines is struck it is seen to turn over and slide sidewise down to earth in a "death dive." Of course the performance was done by American fliers acting especially for the film. The exhibition is full of sizzling thrills. Mr. Buschman, playing the role of Hugh Brown, an American ace, figures as the lone Yankee fighting the Hun squadron. "Those fellows are pulling off stunts for fun," continued the veteran. "We used to do that on the battle front. We would do a dozen tricks a day to keep our hand in. But you never see a Hun doing a trick for fun—that is, no really clever stunt that risked his neck. The only time a Hun machine ever took a death dive was when it was a real death dive and not make believe." The aviation scenes are merely an incident in "Daring Hearts," which is replete with sensational happenings of adventure, romance and war. The settings are mostly laid in Alsace.
