Plant All Animals Hate.

A most interesting plant is the View ginia wild ginger. There are several other species, as far south as Fiorida and northward to Connecticut. The plant grows in very hilly and wooded places, says the American Forestra Magazine, and is easily recognized b its kidney-shaped leaves and curios purplish brown flowers. These flower grow one to a stem. No living this will eat the hitter leaves, and rarely see the flower unless you h for it, for it hides itself out of
