## PURPIL VICTOR IN FIRST 1919 FOOTBALL GAME

Naperville High School Comes Here Tomorrow and Old Rivals Will Clash Again.

D. G. H. S. came out on top last Saturday afternoon in the first football game of the season, winning from East Aurora by the close score of 6 to 0.

The Aurora eleven and their rooters came confident that there would be but one outcome to the game and with them, of course, in the lead. They went home, however, a sadder and wiser crew.

A large crowd had gathered at the North Side Field to see the contest and the bright day made the weather ideal. Each team had the usual preliminaries to go through before play started in earnest. However, from the first blast of the referee's whistle to the moment time was called it was a real game. Lots of action, close plays and the evident chance that either side could win kept the interest at fever heat.

Fumbling was plentiful by both of the teams as is usual at the start of a new season and when the men are mostly green.

Several times the Purple rushes and forward passes brought them inside of Aurora's ten-yard line, but in the pinches they could not gain. At no time was the local goal seriously threatened.

In spite of the fact that they used twenty men during the game, Aurora could do nothing against the local stone-wall defense.

One feature of the game was the punting of Singleterry. He was cool every time he was called upon to punt and kicked very effectively. He got distance and the many times he punted never failed once to get the ball away clean.

Coach Van Antwerp says that Allison shows signs of developing into a good quarter. "He used his head in Saturday's game," said he, when asked about the game, "and seems to have played the entire afternoon without once making a serious error."

"You may say," he went on, "that the entire team played well. In spite of inexperience, of lack of weight, and of the handicap of never playing together before in a game, they did fine. They put up a good defense and their offense was not so slow either."

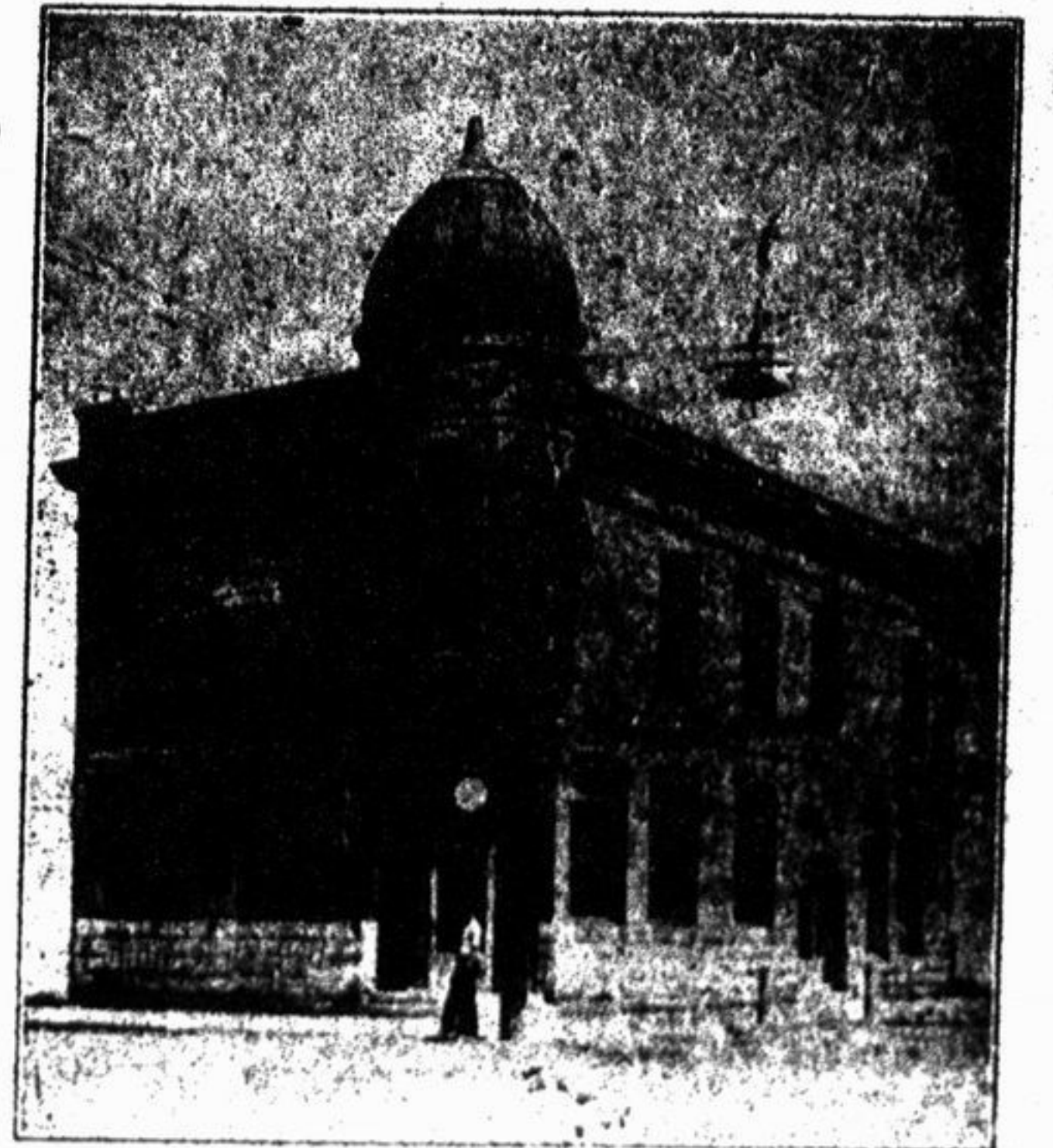
In large measure the returned soldiers and sailors will have paid off their debt to the Salvation Army next Saturday night when the organization's Home Service Fund Campaign comes to an end throughout the state. At least the impulse which the ex-military men gave the "drive" during the first three days of the week indicated that the state's quota of \$750,000, as well as Cook County's separate allotment of \$1,500,000, would be more than complete by next Saturday night.

When the campaign had reached its originally planned close, September 29th, it was found that the fund was far undersubscribed, both in the state and Chicago, and that circumstances over which the Army had no control made it necessary to continue the work another week if the goal were to be reached.

It was at this point that the ex-military men from civil life aroused themselves to the situation and, in memory of the heroic services given them by the Salvation Army in France set out to sweep the movement to its conclusion.

Previously every city in the state had seen volunteer members of the A. E. F. speaking and collecting for the cause, but up until last Monday morning there had been no concerted, massed attack by the men of the khaki and the men of the blue.

However, when veterans swarmed out in hundreds, serving freely, gladly and in most instances without any plan or system other than to get the money whenever and wherever they could, the movement took on new life and the bells of the tambourines soon were lost in the tinkle of ringing coins. Without any special publicity appeal, for the most part without letting it be known that they were serving again, "doughboys" and "gobs" went swiftly about this new business in the taciturn, unemotional manner of the American military man.
