

### BISHOP ANDERSON SPOKE AT SAINT ANDREW'S CHURCH

Noted Churchman Addresses Congregation on World-Wide Unification of Churches.

The Rt. Rev. Charles P. Anderson, D. D., Bishop of the Chicago diocese, Episcopal Church, delivered an address at St. Andrew's Episcopal Church last Sunday morning at the 11:00 o'clock services, the text of which was "The Nation-wide Campaign, or 'The Unification of the Church.'"

Bishop Anderson took part in the regular church services and then confirmed ten new members, boys and girls, who will be a valuable asset to St. Andrew's in its rush to the fore as one of the most active churches in Downers Grove in all that a church implies.

The noted churchman launched forth on his subject with clear and precise enunciation which held its hearers to the last syllable. He told how the church had organized and prepared a program by which it would enable them to tell in the minutest detail just what each parish was in need of and what each parish was able to do in the unification scheme. The idea was to put forth a definite

program that all churches were to work on together in order to accomplish spiritually what the world needed today. Each parish was required to submit to the central body a statement of its resources, plans, problems and needs. These were to be taken in the composite and the governing body of the church to plan a definite program by which the church hoped to do its work of leading the world out of chaos and make "democracy safe for the world."

**World Needs Religion.**  
"The crying need of the world today," said he, and he has just returned from a trip abroad where he gave much time and thought to the subject, "is religion. We need organization and democratization of churches; people are in need of religion; it is necessary for them to come out of their state of spiritual inertia, in order for them to adjust themselves to the new order of things." Bishop Anderson ventured to say that two-thirds of the adult population of almost every city, town or village in the country, did not have church connections and were not actively engaged in spreading the doctrines of Jesus Christ to the world. "A sad state of affairs," said he, "and we must teach it to them in order to save the world from ruin."

**Democratization Question of the Hour.**  
In another part of his address Bishop Anderson said that democratization was the question of the hour. That when the whole world was torn by strife and discord, he was humiliated to say, "members of our Con-

gress at Washington were playing party politics instead of endeavoring to promote international friendship." In conclusion the speaker said, "Things will never be as they were in August 1914, a new order is coming and we must adjust ourselves to that order. Partnership between capital and labor is one of the new order of things, but both of those parties are fighting each other bitterly and all I can see is the idea of materialistic philosophy prevailing on the part of both sides. And so we need religion to settle the momentous questions arising from the upheaval of the world, and every man, woman and child in the church must be an active worker for the Kingdom of God or he is of no use in this new order of things which has descended upon us."

"That is the idea of the Nation-wide Campaign, the unification of the Episcopal Church, its members, organizations and resources, in order to make it an efficient organization for the new work that is being cut out for it."

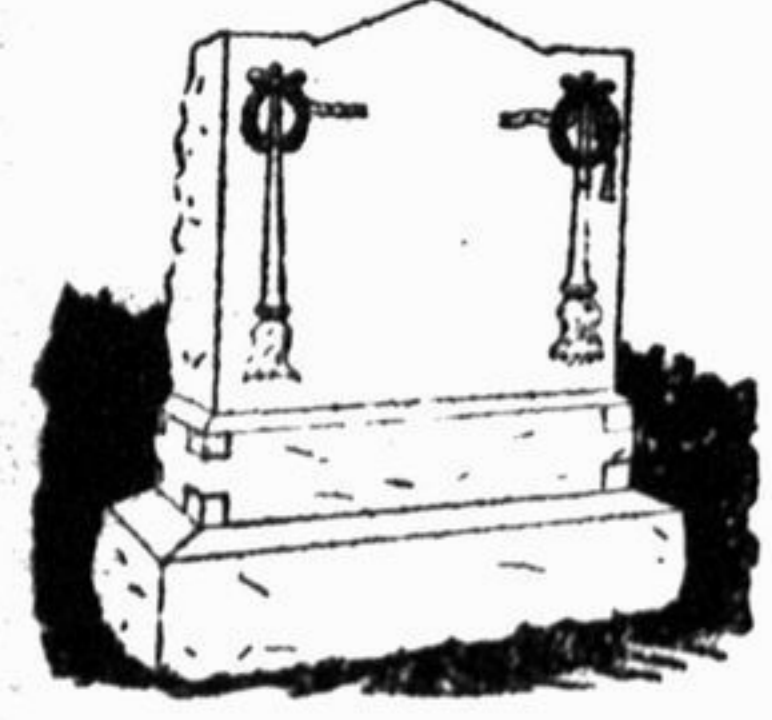
