COUNTY TEACHERS' INSTITUTE ENJOYS FINE ATTENDANCE

Almost Every Educator in County Met in Annual Session at Wheaton Last Week.

With an almost 100 per cent attendance the Superintendents, Principals and teachers of Du Page County met in annual session at Wheaton during the week of September 29-October 3.

The program was exceptionally strong in educational value, and enough of variation to make every number an attraction.

The Hon. Martin G. Brumbaugh, War Governor of Pennsylvania, a leading educator and popular institute lecturer, left a profound impression upon the teachers by his depth and wealth of thought and the strength of his rich, rugged personality.

Dr. H. M. Crooks, President of Alma College, Alma, Michigan, endeared himself to the hearts of his hearers through his message of inspiration and helpfulness presented in strikingly original thought and irresistible humor.

Equally impressive were the messages of Dr. E. E. Rall, President of Northwestern College, Naperville, Dr. C. A. Blanchard, President of Wheaton College, Wheaton and Dr. Paul Crusius of the Junior College, Elmhurst.

Supt. Jesse Smith delighted the institute with his lecture on flowers and trees illustrated with beautifully colored lantern slides.

Other features were W. S. Battis, master impersonator of Dickens' characters, the Hon. Henry Rathbone, the

eloquent orator, in his lecture "Thrill."

Rachelle S. Yarros, M. D., State and Federal representative in the "Health Crusade," whose frank and fluent presentation of disease in relation to the present and future generations, made a deep and lasting impression.

The institute was pleased with the presentation of "Shore Acres," by Prof. Guy Eugene Oliver of North Western College, the skillful pageant work of Miss A. Meye Conklin, Principal of Warrenville schools, the delightful songs of Miss Ann Truimingham of the Columbia School of Music, the entertainment by the North Western College Quartette, the practical addresses of Mr. E. B. Heaton, Farm Advisor and Mr. A. C. Page, Editor Orange Judd Farmer to the teachers of the rural schools, and the demonstration of games given by Dr. W. H. Ritchie, "Y" Secretary for Du Page County.

Prof. J. W. Yoder of Philadelphia had charge of the music. The institute responded at once to his genial, persuasive manner and made each session attractive with hearty singing. Prof. Yoder favored the audience with solos which were received with much applause.

It is the testimony of Superintendents and teachers that this institute has been one of the most helpful and inspirational ever attended by them here or in other counties and states.

Friday morning of the last day a memorial service was held in memory of former County Superintendent of Schools Royal T. Morgan. Dr. H. V. Holt, of the Gary-Memorial Church and pastor of the deceased, addressed the institute with an appropriate message. The following resolutions were unanimously adopted by the institute.

WHEREAS, We miss today the familiar voice and form of one who for nearly a third of a century was the County Superintendent of DuPage County and was known by every boy and girl, and

WHEREAS, Prof. Royal T. Morgan was not only a county superintendent but a poet, an orator and a big-hearted, sympathetic, Christian teacher whose presence inspired and brought cheer and courage wherever he went; therefore be it,

RESOLVED, That we the teachers of this county in institute assembled do hereby unanimously affirm our sincere appreciation for the kind and sympathetic work that he did with the parents, children and teachers of this county, and be it further

RESOLVED, That in our opinion we cannot pay a higher tribute to his memory than by emulating his many virtues and by striving to inspire the boys and girls with a greater love for the beautiful in nature, a keener appreciation of the choicest in literature, a love for God and a deeper love and sympathy for their fellow.

VILLAGE ORDINANCE

An ordinance amending Section 4, Chapter XLVIII, Pertaining to "Water System and Matters Relative Thereof."

Be it ordained by the Council of the Village of Downers Grove, Du Page County, Illinois, that Section Four of the above entitled ordinance be hereby amended to read as follows: Rule 4 All service pipe connections of less than 2 inches in diameter shall be made of lead pipe.

Service pipe connections shall mean all pipe extending from the Village water mains to the water meter. All service pipe extending from the water mains to the buffalo box shall be 1/2 inch XX lead, weighing not less than four pounds to the linear foot.

All pipe extending from the buffalo box shall be 1/2 inch in size of "strong lead," weighing not less than three pounds to the linear foot.

This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication.
