BOY SCOUT NOTES

Last Saturday Scouts Wm. S. Ellis, Wm. G. O'Neill, Jr., John Stoops, G. Ray, Donald VanValen, Wm. Ray, Donald Towlesy, Kenneth Morton, Donald Davis, Eugene Foster and Lyman Dum, together with Scoutmaster Wm. G. O'Neill and F. N. Davis, went to Brookfield and participated in the general meet, field day exercises, camp fire and supper of the district. The meet was in charge of Guy J. Dart, Scout Commissioner of Hinsdale, who was assisted by acting scout executive Robert K. Miller, W. E. Conrad and C. C. Gilchrist of La Grange, and W. A. Adams of Brookfield. The afternoon was spent in games and the evening with a meal of hunter's stew, camp fire and story telling. Attorney W. A. Adams served as the speaker of the evening. Scout Ellis proved himself champion of the district as heavyweight horse-back fighter. The championship of the middle-weights was not definitely determined, but Scout Butler was in the lead when, due to approaching dusk and the strenuous exercises the judges ordered the horse stabled.

The boys who attended Camp Cheaugau during the last season have received a copy of "The Nor'Wester," a little newspaper published by the North West District Boy Scouts of America, of which D. M. Scout Saves His Own Life With First Aid

While digging clams in company with a twelve-year-old boy, Scout Gordon Battey, Patrol Leader, Troop 5, New Rochelle, N. Y., was injured by a rifle shot in the abdomen. Both boys were in bathing suits, but with apparently nothing to work with, Gordon administered first aid to himself before he let his friend paddle him four miles home.

First he had the boy help him into the water so he could cleanse the wound, and then took the strings from around the waist of his bathing suit and jammed them into the wound until he quenched the flow of blood. From his own and the other fellow's suit he tore enough to improvise a pad and strips with which he bound himself up, and then tumbled into the bottom of the canoe.

Before starting, Gordon told the boy to dash cold water in his face should he be getting faint. When he felt he was getting weak he asked that the lunch be opened because he thought a sandwich would keep up his strength.

When surgeons arrived at the boy's home they refused to touch the dressing, saying its effectiveness could not be improved upon, and that if it had not been for Gordon's Boy Scout training in first aid he would not have been alive when he reached home.

His father writes, "I feel that I have the Boy Scout organization to thank for having my boy alive today, and I shall help all I can in building up this splendid organization." (Scouting.)

STATE OFFICERS BACK LOWDEN FOR NEXT PRESIDENT

Secretary of State Emmerson issued the following statement to the public:

"Governor Frank O. Lowden has been much in public mind and his name has been freely discussed in the press throughout the country during the past year as the ideal type of practical, constructive, business man and administrative official which the Republican national convention will seek next year as the party standard-bearer. Much pressure has been brought to bear upon Governor Lowden by Republican leaders of all former party elements throughout the nation to permit the use of his name as a candidate for the presidency. Sentiment in his behalf has grown steadily and has crystallized rapidly of late.

"Up to this time no united step has been taken by his friends towards perfecting a working organization in Illinois to promote his interest and present his name to the convention. The meeting held today for that purpose was composed of all of the elective state officials of Illinois, the men who have been closely associated with him officially during the past three years and who know intimately his great constructive and administrative ability and his fitness for the high office of president. Governor Lowden has demonstrated that clearness and breadth of vision, that soundness of judgment, that fidelity to public trust, that loyalty to the ideals of free government, that courage and firmness in official action which reveal him as splendidly fitted in all ways to guide this nation through the critical years of reconstruction.

"He possesses the courage and zeal of Roosevelt, and the caution of Taft. The voluntary movement inaugurated by the elective state officials will culminate in the early selection of a large general campaign committee representative of all elements of the Republican party in Illinois, which will spread out and become nationwide as the campaign proceeds. Illinois Republicans firmly believe that with Frank O. Lowden as president our country will enter upon a new era of development, peace and prosperity."
