### EVANGELICAL BODIES RE-UNITED

United Brethren May Also Enter Merger Which Was Consummated at Cedar Falls, Ia.

In Quadrennial Conference now in session at Cedar Falls, Iowa, the official delegates of the Evangelical Association accepted by unanimous vote the basis for re-union of the Evangelical Association and the United Evangelical Church which was presented by a special commission appointed for that purpose several months ago. This plan was also accepted by unanimous vote at the General Conference of the United Evangelical Church.

The unanimous decision of the official delegates of both churches thus brings together into one strong Evangelical body its two divisions separated for the last quarter of a century. It is a movement in the right direction greatly augmenting the opportunities and usefulness of the church.

An official delegate from the United Brethren Church brought to General Conference the fraternal greetings of his church and an inspiring message. He received hearty applause when he said: "If the re-united church of the two Evangelical bodies wants to talk union with the United Brethren Church, I am here to report that for our part the machinery is ready."

The Evangelical Association is represented in Downers Grove by the First Evangelical Church on the corner of Main street and Maple avenue.
