WHEREAS, The Board of Education is desirous that the public take a livelier interest in our schools and in vital educational problems and WHEREAS, It recognizes that the Mothers Club has opened a channel for the dissemination of educational information and discussion of educational problems, and,

WHEREAS, It appreciates the possibilities of greater cooperation between parents of both sexes and teachers.

BE IT RESOLVED, That the Board of Education through the secretary invite the Mothers Club thru its president, to consider the organization of a Parent-Teacher Association to take the place of the Mothers Club and broaden its work, and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That if it seems wise to form such a new organization, it is the desire of the Board of Education that the public school buildings be used for at least a majority of the meetings of the new organization, in order that, in this way among others, our schools may be brought more prominently to

the attention of the general public, and, RESOLVED, That it is the sense of the Board of Education that the constitution and by-laws of such new organization shall provide for a Program Committee consisting of an equal number of teachers (selected from any recognized local educational institution, public or private) and parents, to be presided over by the Superintendent of School District No. 58, who shall have a veto power with reference to any recommendations of the Program Committee.

Moved and seconded that the resolution be adopted. Motion carried.
