AMERICAN LEGION OPEN HOUSE WILL BE ARMISTICE DAY

Alexander Bradley Burns Post To Be Hosts to Village at Their New Club Rooms.

On Tuesday evening, November 11, Armistice Day, Alexander Bradley Burns Post, American Legion, will hold open house at their new club rooms, in the Dickie Building, corner Belmont and Forest avenues.

The occasion will take the place of the last welcome home which was to have been held when all the boys were back from the service. The Community League, in whose charge the welcome home affairs were held, asked the opinion of the boys as to the advisability of holding another. This was several weeks ago and the decision of the Legion was that if it was all the same to the League the money would come in far more handy toward furnishing their new club rooms than to put in their stomachs. As one member aptly expressed it, "It's the difference between pleasure for one evening and for years."

There was but one condition attached to the gift and that was when the rooms were ready for occupancy that the Legion hold open house to the village, so that everyone could see the disposition of the money. At the last meeting of the local post, held Monday evening, the first meeting in their new rooms, it was decided that next Tuesday was the logical day for the inspection.

Everyone in the village, who backed up the boys in their fight for democracy, whether with money, time or good will, is invited to their club rooms next Tuesday evening. There will be informal dancing from ten until twelve. The Legion will be assisted by the recently formed auxiliary of relatives in the entertainment of the guests.

Other Activities.

Besides the open house many other things of importance were acted on at Monday's meeting. A large representation was present and all seemed pleased with the progress thus far made on the rooms.

Thomas Kidwell and Robert Mac Dougal were elected to represent the local post on the Du Page County Board which will care for all county matters in connection with the Legion.

An invitation from the Womens Club to participate in their program of Wednesday evening, November 12, at the Dickie Theatre was read and accepted.

Robert Dickson and Robert Mac Dougal were appointed to meet with representatives of Co. H to arrange for rifle competition at the request of the latter organization. A rifle team will be organized and no doubt some interesting matches held.

The entertainment committee was instructed to arrange for a dance on Thanksgiving Day evening and other things of a social nature were discussed.

Paul Bentley, temporary secretary of the post, and delegate to the State Convention which was held at Peoria, gave a report of the convention. He told of the few things accomplished by the men who could not do much work because of the short time they had. One of the most important messages he brought was that all posts in the state would now elect permanent officers, to serve for at least one year, and this will be done at the next meeting which will be held Monday evening, November 17th.

PURPLE LOST TO BATAVIA BY 19 TO 7 SCORE

Downers Grove Town Team Won From Geneva Athletic Association Eleven Sunday.

For the second time this year the Purple and White came home trailing their banners. They lost last Saturday to Batavia to the heavier and steeper playing of that town's high school team by the score of 19 to 7. The team played fairly good and might have won but repeated fumbles in the pinches tossed off the game.

The game was marked by sensational catches, long runs and incompetent refereeing. No one complained of a lack of excitement.

Downers Grove's only touchdown was a fluke. Boon picked up a fumbled ball on Batavia's twenty yard line and ran through an opening for a score. Shurtle kicked goal from a difficult angle. Boon left the game immediately after the score for expressing his opinion of the opposing quarterback and of the referee. The quarterback also retired.

Batavia scored in the first quarter when a punt by Phelps hit Bush and rebounded back of the Purple goal line. Batavia recovered the ball and soon kicked goal.

Again in the second quarter the enemy worked a long pass, advancing to Downers' ten yard line and soon smashed over the line but missed the goal.

Downers scored in the third quarter on a fumble. Batavia retaliated with a long run for a touchdown.

The Purple came back strong in the last quarter and was on the opponent's two yard line when the final whistle blew.

Town Team Won.

Downers Grove Town Team showed pretty good form for the first game of the season last Sunday considering the short time they have been practicing. They defeated the crack Geneva Athletics by the score of 21 to 14.

All plays made by the locals, with very few exceptions, were those of straight football tactics, using line bucks and end runs. Only two or three forward passes were tried by Cline who is a whirlwind at setting the ball over the line. Downers' steady gains on line plays due to the good work of the guards, Brown and Roth on the right side of the line made openings for the backs so that a team could have been driven through.

Geneva had a good team and they on treated that they under took the game. They did not use line plays

to any great extent but made their gains on end runs and forward passes.

In the first quarter the locals seemed a little slow in starting, but it did not take them long to get into the game. Grush made the first points by placing a neat drop kick between the goal posts from the twenty-five yard line.

In the second quarter Cline carried the ball over the line for a touchdown, but failed to kick goal. Downers 6, Geneva 0. Geneva then kicked to the locals and after about three minutes play Downers fumbled the ball near the 40 yard line. In the second play from this point they forward to the crack quarter of Geneva, Thornberg, who gained 20 yards. Three end runs were made and Johnson, their right half carried the ball over the line. Cummings kicked goal. Score, Downers 9, Geneva 7.

Geneva kicked to Downers in the third quarter, Cline receiving the ball and running down the field for thirty yards to Geneva's thirty yard line. The locals then took the ball for a touchdown after four minutes of play Bertolin carrying the pigskin over the line. Geneva again kicked to the locals Johnston receiving the ball making about twenty yards. Steady gain were made by Bruns, who played full in the third and fourth quarters. He showed the old form even tho a little soft from lack of practise.

Davenport was switched from left end to right half. Bertolin from quarter to left end. Johnston from left tackle to quarter. Downer from left half to left tackle. Cline from left half to left tackle and then taken out on account of a sprained ankle and his position was replaced by Paul Vix, another old timer from the high school eleven. After these changes had been made Downers proceeded down the field with the ball, until Davenport fumbled.

Geneva then took the ball and after several attempts to make gains around the ends had failed, made a forward pass to Thornberg, who receiving it in the open field, ran fifty yards for a spectacular touchdown. Score, Downers 15, Geneva 14.

Downers then kicked to Geneva, who failing to make the necessary gains, gave the ball over to the locals. They showed the same old pep, making a little distance every down, and "Slippery" Downer carried the ball over the line for the final score of the afternoon. Final score, Downers 21, Geneva 14.

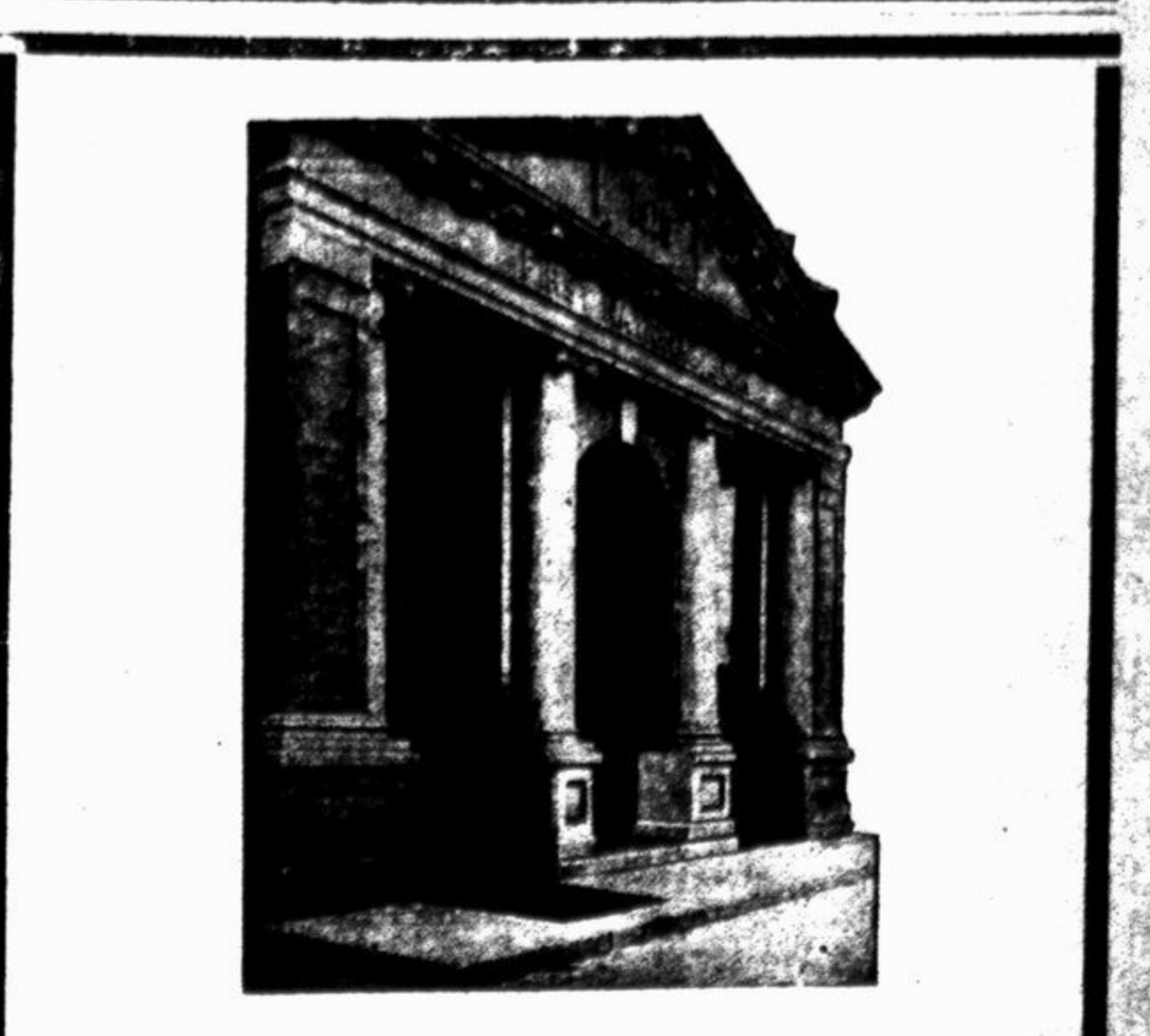
