The Illinois State Historical Library is undertaking the collection and preservation of all war activities of every village, town, city, township, county of the State; this material to be edited in a history of the war activities of the State of Illinois.

This is a matter of interest to every citizen of Du Page County. The war record of Illinois is third among the states; New York being first and Pennsylvania second. Du Page County contributed a full share in men, money and service to the splendid record of our state, and it is fitting that this achievement be preserved upon the pages of history.

My attention has been called to the criticism of Christian Science and Mrs. Eddy, its Founder, by Mr. Stephen Byron Dexter, in the Reporter of the seventh of November. I beg leave to reply thereto.

Mr. Dexter, in common with others who make attacks on Christian Science does not correctly quote Mrs. Eddy's writings. He is reported as having quoted from page 242 of Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures: "There is but one way to heaven and harmony and Christ, Divine Science shows us this way." The correct statement is,—"There is but one way to heaven, harmony and Christ, in divine Science shows us this way." The correct wording on page 231 is,—"thru Christ in divine Science." The term "divine Science" means the science of Christianity which was taught and practiced by Christ Jesus. Knowledge of that Science as it is revealed to the individual consciousness of men and women, destroys sin and heals the sick. It brings to pass that which is written—"He that believeth on me the works that I do shall he do also."

His accusation that Mrs. Eddy asserts she has given to the world truth which Jesus Christ did not discover or teach, is absurd. What she did discover was that Jesus' teachings constituted the Science of Christianity, a Science as demonstrable here today as it was in the days of Jesus and his disciples. She took nothing from and added nothing to the inspired word of the Bible for she could only discover that which already existed.

Mrs. Eddy in no wise classed herself with the Virgin Mary. On the contrary she says in her book, "The First Church of Christ, Scientist, and Miscellany" (page 303) "I have not the inspiration nor the aspiration to be a first or a second Virgin-mother—her duplicate, antecedent, or subsequent."

As for classing herself with Christ, her writings show her to have been a most humble follower of Christ, sitting at his feet praying and waiting for more of his reappearing.

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COUNTY "Y" NOTES

The past week was an eventful one in the schools of Du Page County. Thru the County "Y" Secretary nine different addresses were delivered by Dr. J. G. Brooks of Wheaton to over 1300 people. The experiences of Dr. Brooks while serving in France the 20th Engineers as a "Y" secretary were most instructive and entertaining. He gave graphic descriptions of the enormous work carried on overseas in 3356 different points in hearty cooperation with the 60 points of the K. of C. and the 40 units of the Salvation Army. He said that during the war there was splendid cooperation and service among the welfare agencies; and as the Y. M. C. A. was the one with whom the military dealt they had charge of much the larger field of responsibility. They had complete charge of all the S. D. S. area, rest areas and sending out of entertainers and athletic directors and supplies. Over 2 1/2 million articles of athletic goods were given out by the Y. M. C. A. to the other welfare organizations and by their own units. But the touch of home furnished in the huts by the 3,000 and more Christian women was the distinctive service most appreciated by the soldier.

Besides speaking to the schools while in session at West Chicago Glen Ellyn, Lombard, Elmhurst and Downers Grove, Dr. Brooks also spoke for the Hi Y clubs at Downers Grove and Hinsdale at evening meetings at which the public was invited. He also addressed the C. H. C., a small club of the Wheaton high school on Wednesday evening.
