A. in the country, as the scope and policy of the whole future work will be passed upon.

Miss Katherine Mills, a professional violinist, who has just come among us rendered two violin solos showing great skill and fineness of touch.

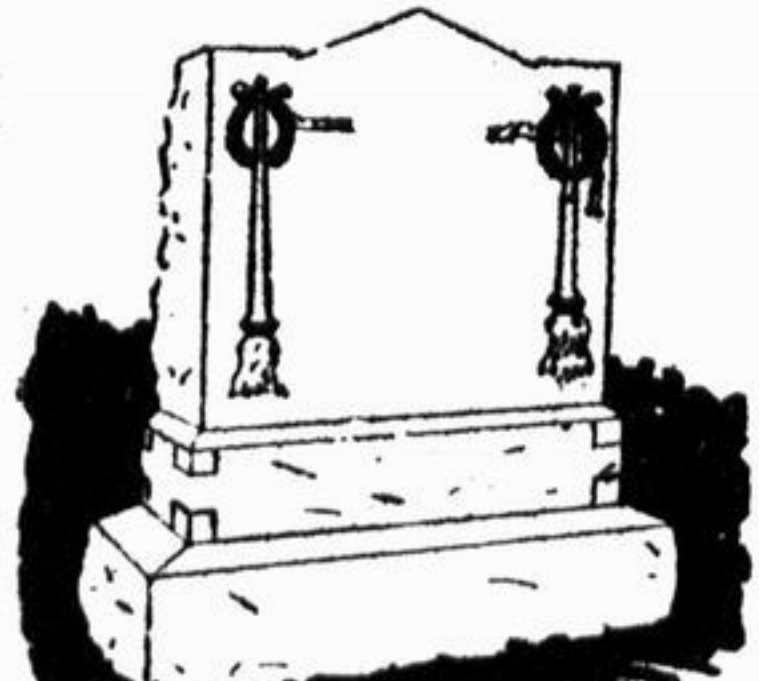
