

LOCALS EASILY WON FROM WAU-KEGAN ELEVEN

Winning football games seems to be the best thing the Downers Grove town team does. Last Sunday afternoon they gathered the heavy and much touted Waukegan team into the fold, decisively beating them by a score of twenty-five to nothing.

In spite of a weight handicap in their favor, the visitors did not score a point, although they did fight hard even when it was apparent that they were hopelessly outclassed.

In the first quarter Bertolin carried the ball over the line for a touchdown in the first few minutes of play. Davenport failing to kick goal.

After the down, Waukegan kicked to Downers, Johnstone receiving the ball and making a good gain. Two minutes more play and we had the ball on their thirty-five yard line from which point Kingsley neatly dropped-kicked the pigskin between the goal posts.

In the second quarter "Slippery" Downer made a touchdown, Davenport kicking goal. Score 16 to 0.

Downers then kicked to Waukegan who were downed on their thirty yard line. The next two downs they were thrown for losses and then they attempted to forward pass. The first was incompletable but the second one was intercepted by Davenport who made a magnificent eighty-five yard run for a touchdown. Chas. Baker and Orson Downer acted as his interference. Downers getting his man after a run of twenty yards. Baker kept alongside "Davy" all the way down the field with one eye on an opponent who was right at Davenport's heels.

This play took the heart out of the visitors and the game was won. In the third quarter Rogers kicked over the goal from the thirty yard line making it a certainty.

In this game every man on the team played the game and played it hard. They did not outdo themselves however because of the Hinsdale game they expected to play here next Sunday. The Hinsdale eleven were eager to play until the locals made the wins they have lately but now their ardor is cooling and they have evidently concluded that we were too fast for them.

MANY HEAR LECTURE ON CO-OPERATION

Quite a crowd of local people attended a meeting at Dicke's Hall on Monday evening to hear Harrison M. Parker talk on "Co-operation, Its Purposes, Methods and Results."

Mr. Parker was here in the interests of the Co-operative Society of America to spread the gospel of this society locally in an endeavor to get enough local people to take stock in the proposition and open one of their branch stores here.

After giving the purposes of the organization, which to the casual hearer sound fine, the speaker answered questions hurled at him from all parts of the hall. Several very stiff inquiries regarding the financing of the proposition, the distribution of the dividends, the salaries paid, and other details were answered.

F. J. Milnes, one of those interested in establishing a branch here, acted as chairman and introduced the speaker.

We have it on the authority of Mr. I. M. Howe, another backer, that 12 local people have signed up to take stock and that 300 signers are necessary before it can be successfully started.

Co-operative stores have been successful in other places and several have not been. There are instances within reach of local people where the plan has failed miserably. Not, however, so far as can be learned, the society which is operating here. Before anything is carried through to a certain conclusion they would advise a thorough investigation, not only of the plan but of the men who are bringing it to Downers Grove.

ESTIMATED TRUE VALUE OF ILLINOIS FARM LAND

T. A. Polleys, tax commissioner of the C. & N. W. Ry., has made an interesting table of the true value of farm lands of the State of Illinois by counties.

He bases his estimate on five different plans as follows:

PLAN 1: Based exclusively on land values shown by U. S. Census for 1900 and 1910.

PLAN 2: Based in all counties on U. S. Census values for 1900 and 1910 and on 1912 assessed full values used in connection with land sales in 1917 in 52 counties.

PLAN 3: Based on 1918 assessed full value in all counties used in connection with the assessment ratio developed from land sales 1915 to 1919 in 22 Chicago and North Western Counties.

PLAN 4: Based on 1918 assessed full value, used in connection with banker's estimates of true value as of April 1, 1919 in 43 counties.

PLAN 5: Based on average value per acre of surrounding counties as fixed by plans 1 to 4 inclusive.

Du Page County land is estimated according to the above plans No. 1, \$160.00; No. 2, \$233.50; No. 3, \$207.00; No. 4, \$209.75; No. 5, \$231.00; and the composite value of the five plans is \$194.25.

In the same classification with this county are the counties of Cole, De Kalb, Henry, Kane, Kankakee, Lee, Marshall, Mercer, Peoria, Putnam, St. Clair, Stark, Whiteside and Will.

The highest land values found were in Champaign, Cook, Livingston, Logan, Macon, McLean and Platt counties where the estimated values were from \$250. an acre and up.
