

NOTICE OF VILLAGE SPECIAL BOND ELECTION

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that a special election will be held in the Village of Downers Grove, in the County of Du Page, State of Illinois, on Friday, the 5th day of December, A. D. 1919, at the Village Hall, at which election there will be submitted to the voters an ordinance adopted by the Council of said Village, which is in words and figures as follows:

AN ORDINANCE

Providing for the issuance of Bonds of the Village of Downers Grove in the amount of Eleven Thousand Dollars (\$11,000.), and providing for the levy of an Annual Tax to pay the installments of Principal and Interest thereof and submitting said Ordinance to the voters at a Special Election called to be held in said Village on December 5th, A. D. 1919.

WHEREAS, the Farmers and Merchants Bank of the Village of Downers Grove, Illinois, on the twenty-third day of October, A. D. 1919, recovered a judgment against the Village of Downers Grove for the sum of Eleven Thousand Dollars (\$11,000.), and costs of suit, in the Circuit Court of DuPage County, Illinois, which judgment is wholly unsatisfied and is an outstanding obligation of said Village, for the payment of which it is desired to make immediate provision, and there being no funds in the Treasury of said Village available for the purpose aforesaid,

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE VILLAGE OF DOWNERS GROVE, ILLINOIS:

SECTION 1—That for the purpose of providing funds for the payment of said judgment rendered against said Village and subject to the favorable outcome of the election which is hereby called to be held on December 5th, A. D. 1919, there is hereby authorized to be issued the negotiable coupon bonds of the Village of Downers Grove in the amount of eleven thousand dollars (\$11,000.). SAID BONDS—twenty-two (22) in number—numbered from one to twenty-two (1-22) both inclusive, in denominations of five hundred dollars (\$500.) each, dated November 1, A. D. 1919, bearing interest, evidenced by coupons, at the rate of five per centum (5 per cent) per annum, payable semi-annually on the first day of May and of November of each year; the first installment shall be for 18 months and shall be payable May 1, 1921; said bonds shall mature on the first day of November in each of the years and for the amounts as follows:

Both principal and interest of said bonds shall be payable in lawful money of the United States of America at the Banking House of the CENTRAL TRUST COMPANY OF ILLINOIS, at Chicago, Illinois.

SECTION 2—Said bonds and coupons shall be in substantially the following forms with the necessary variations to indicate the different numbers and maturities, respectively, to wit:

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS, that the Village of Downers Grove, in the County of Du Page, State of Illinois, acknowledges itself to owe and for value received, hereby promises to pay bearer on the first day of November, A. D. 19... the principal sum of

FIVE HUNDRED DOLLARS

together with interest thereon from the date hereof until paid at the rate of five per centum (5 per cent) per annum, payable semi-annually on the first day of May and of November, of each year upon presentation and surrender of the annexed interest coupons as they severally become due. The first installment shall be for 18 months and shall be payable May 1, 1921. Both principal and interest of said bond are hereby made payable in lawful money of the United States of America, at the Banking House of the CENTRAL TRUST COMPANY OF ILLINOIS, Chicago, Illinois. And for the prompt payment of the installments of principal and interest of this bond as they respectively become due, the full faith, credit and resources of said Village of Downers Grove are hereby irrevocably pledged.

This bond is one of a series of like tenor, except as to number and maturity, issued by said Village for the purpose of funding a certain judgment rendered against said Village and pursuant to an ordinance duly passed and adopted by the Council of said Village, which was duly ratified and approved by the voters of said Village at an election legally called and held, pursuant to and in full conformity with all the requirements of the Constitution and laws of the State of Illinois.

AND IT IS HEREBY CERTIFIED AND RECITED that all acts, conditions and things required to exist, happen and be performed precedent to and in the issuance of this bond have existed, happened and been performed in regular and due form, time and manner as required by law, and that the total indebtedness of said Village, including this bond, does not exceed any statutory or constitutional limitations.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the Village of Downers Grove has caused this bond to be signed by the Mayor, attested by the Village Clerk, and its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed, and the interest coupons hereto attached to be executed with the fac-simile signatures of said Officers this first day of November, A. D. 1919.

SECTION 3—That for the purpose

of providing for the payment of the installments of the principal and interest of said bonds as they respectively become due, there shall be and there is hereby levied for each of the years, 1919 to 1930, both inclusive, and until the principal and interest of said bonds shall be fully paid, there shall be collected a direct annual tax upon all of the taxable property of the Village of Downers Grove, in addition to all other taxes, a tax sufficient to produce annually from the annual levies in each of the years 1919 to 1930, both inclusive, the following sums to pay the installments of principal and interest on said bonds.

All of said taxes when collected shall be placed and kept in a separate sinking fund and used to promptly pay the installments of the principal and interest of said bonds as they become payable and for no other purpose whatever.

Suitable provision to insure the full compliance with the requirements of this section shall be made and included in the annual appropriation bill and tax levy for each of the years aforesaid, and in case at any time any portion of said taxes shall not have been collected in time to meet the payment of the installments of principal and interest of said bonds as they shall fall due, as herein provided, the Village Treasurer is hereby authorized and directed, as occasion may require, to temporarily borrow from the general funds of the Village, or any other fund that shall be for the time available for such purpose, sufficient money to make such payments, such funds to be reimbursed from the proceeds of taxes when collected, as hereinabove provided for.

SECTION 4—The bonds provided for by this ordinance shall not be issued until this ordinance shall have been approved by the voters of said village at the special election hereby called to be held the 5th day of December, A. D. 1919, at the Village Hall, in said Village of Downers Grove, at which election this ordinance shall be submitted to the voters of said Village for approval. The Village Clerk is hereby directed to give notice of said election by publication and posting the same in the manner provided by law at least twenty (20) days prior to said election. The polls of said election shall be open at 7 o'clock in the morning and closed at 5 o'clock P. M. on that day.

SECTION 5—BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that in the event the voters of said Village at said special election shall vote favorably and approve this ordinance, and the Council of the Village shall have canvassed the vote at said election and declared the result thereof, indicate the approving of this ordinance by the legal voters of the Village, the Village Clerk shall thereupon file with the County Clerk of Du Page County, Illinois, a certified copy of this ordinance. In his certificate attached thereto authenticating the same, the fact shall be certified that the voters voted favorably and approved this ordinance; that the Council of the Village has canvassed the vote cast at said election and declared the result thereof, and that the ordinance is fully effective, and the County Clerk shall thereupon be authorized and required annually in each of the years 1919 to 1930, both years inclusive, to extend the annual tax as provided in this ordinance.

The following named persons are hereby designated to act as judges and clerks at said special election:

SECTION 6—For the purpose of canvassing the returns and declaring the results of said election, and to take any further action deemed necessary or desirable, relative to the issuance of said bonds, a special meeting of the Council of the Village of Downers Grove is hereby called to convene at the regular place of meeting on the 8th day of December, A. D. 1919, at 8 o'clock P. M.

A statement of the substance of this ordinance shall be printed on each of the ballots to be used at said election. Passed by the Council of the Village on the 10th day of November, A. D. 1919.

SUBSTANCE OF ORDINANCE ABOVE REFERRED TO

October 23, 1919, in the Circuit Court of Du Page County, Illinois (for eleven thousand dollars (\$11,000.) and costs of suit. Election called submitting ordinance to the voters at election to be held December 5th, 1919. BY ORDER OF THE COUNCIL OF THE Village of Downers Grove, Du Page County, Illinois. Provides that amount of bonds to be issued shall be ELEVEN THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$11,000.), dated November 1, A. D. 1919, bearing interest at 5 per cent per annum, payable semi-annually on the first day of May and of November of each year until bonds are paid, upon presentation and surrender of interest coupons. Principal of bonds to be paid in the first day of November, of each of the years as follows: \$3,000 in the year 1923, and \$1,000 in each of the years 1924 to 1931, both years inclusive. Principal and interest to be payable at the Banking House of CENTRAL TRUST COMPANY OF ILLINOIS, at Chicago, Illinois. Annual taxes to be levied to pay principal and interest of bonds as follows: in each of the years 1919 to 1921, \$550.00 for interest, 1922, \$550.00 for interest and \$3,000.00 for principal; 1923, \$400.00 for interest and \$1,000.00 for principal; 1924, \$350.00 for interest, and \$1,000.00 for principal; 1925, \$300.00 for interest and \$1,000.00 for principal; 1926, \$250.00 for interest, and \$1,000.00 for principal; 1927, \$200.00 for interest and \$1,000.00 for principal; 1928, \$150.00 for interest, and \$1,000.00 for principal; 1929, \$100.00 for interest, and \$1,000.00 for principal; 1930, \$50.00 for interest, and \$1,000.00 for principal.
