

### COMMUNITY CENTER INCLUDED IN PLANS OF CHURCH SCHOOL

St. Mary's Parish Of East Grove, Contemplating Erection of \$10,000 00 Structure

St. Mary's Parish of East Grove, is contemplating the erection of a \$10,000.00 school building and Sister's home to be built on the church property next summer.

The plans, which have been drawn up, include two study rooms for the school and the sister's home, containing a large living and dining room, kitchen and sleeping apartments on the first floor. The large basement, if the plans are carried out, will be fitted up as a Community Center for the parish. Here the young people of the community will be able to gather evenings for social activities, plays and entertainments of various kinds will be given and it will be the real center of the social life of the vicinity.

The Rev. S. J. Koralewski, pastor of the church, is a young man with a love in his heart for the younger generation of his parish. It is his wish that the children be given every advantage, not only in the school but in the social way. He expects that the new undertaking will furnish a place for his parishioners where they can enjoy to the full the get-together entertainments they have no place to hold now.

#### English to be Taught.

When the rumors of the proposed new school building were first heard, opposition developed among the people of Downers Grove. This was because of a rumor, which had no foundation in fact, that the Polish language was the language to be used in the school. This is not true. English is to be taught in the class rooms same as it is now.

Just who started the rumor or for what purpose it was started has not been determined by those interested in the project.

#### \$5,000 Pledged.

The people of East Grove have generously pledged \$5,000 for the building of the school. Rev. Koralewski has taken upon himself the task of raising two or three thousand more among Polish Catholic churches of Chicago and among those interested in the development of the parochial schools of the church.

### SUPERVISORS NOT WILLING TO PAY PRICE

Put Off Matter of Letting Contract To Publish Proceedings to Next Meeting.

The Board of Supervisors of DuPage County met at Wheaton in regular session last Saturday and transacted the usual routine business.

One of the important things brought up for discussion was the publishing of the official proceedings of the county, required by law to be published in a paper of general circulation in the County.

In the past they have been sent out by the County Clerk to every community newspaper in this County and the Board very generously, oh very, allowed \$15.00 YEAR to the papers printing the proceedings. The mere cost of setting them has exceeded the return by about twenty times to say nothing of the cost of the white space used which it is our business to sell.

The last legislature passed several bills pertaining to the publishing of legal proceedings of any kind, one of which reads in part: "When any notice, advertisement, proclamation, statement, proposal, ordinance or proceedings of an official body or board or any other matter or material is required by law or by order or rule of any court to be published in any newspaper, the minimum reasonable rate shall be ten cents per line for each insertion."

This law was in full force and effect on July 1st and the Supervisors not being willing to pay what the law

calls for, have been figuring since on how to get around it. They thought they had the right system when they sent out notices for bids to all county papers just before the first of the year. However, when these bids were read at last Saturday's meeting it was found that every newspaper proprietor in the county had made the same rate, 10 cents per line per insertion, as the law states. It will be noticed that the MINIMUM rate was quoted, how high a publisher CAN go is evidently limited by the sky.

After debating the matter, both in committee and at a meeting of the full board, they decided to lay the matter on the table until the next meeting.

The price asked by county newspapers it not too high, and if they each ran the proceedings for ten years at the legal rate, they would not make up the money they have lost in the last ten, by running them for almost nothing.
