LOCAL BOWLING FIVE WON FROM LYONS SAT'DAY

Winning High Game and Average For Locals, Smith for Lyons—Local League Notes.

In a bowling match which at first seemed to be fairly even, but later proved to be a walk-away for the locals, they won from a Lyons five on the Dicke alleys Saturday night.

NAPER POST, G. A. R. INSTALLED OFFICERS AT MEETING

Boys in Blue, Veterans of Civil War, Held Regular Meeting Last Saturday.

Naper Post, Grand Army of the Republic, installed officers for the year 1920 at their regular meeting in the Post Hall, Main and Curtiss streets last Saturday afternoon.

The officers installed were: Commander—Frank A. Rogers; Senior V.-Commander—G. T. Hughes; Junior V.-Commander—Fred Veith; Surgeon—John Dailey; Chaplain—Wm. Beidelman; Adjutant—R. W. Bond; Quartermaster, Geo. B. Heardt; Officer of the Day—E. W. Farrar; Patriotic Instructor—Geo. B. Heardt; Officer of the Guard—Geo. Strauly; Sergeant Major—John Mohr.

These veterans of the Civil War, the small remnant of that once glorious army which held the Union intact are still meeting and keeping up the associations formed nearly sixty years ago, in the dark days of '61-'65. The local post holds one meeting a month, on the second Saturday, and great interest is taken by these men in their monthly gathering.

1919 PROSPEROUS YEAR FOR POTTER MFG. & LUMBER

Declare 10% Additional Dividend Common Stock At Celebration Banquet.

At the annual stockholder's meeting of the Potter Mfg. & Lumber Co., held Tuesday afternoon of this week, a very satisfactory report for the past year's business was submitted. R. E. Bateman, president and manager of the company stated that for nearly two years the demand for their manufactured goods had been greater than could be handled and that additional factory space would be necessary. The gross business done in 1919 was greater than any previous year's business and nearly double the 1918 volume.

Over \$25,000.00 in employes wages alone was paid during the year and practically all of that amount is spent with Downers Grove merchants.

The business was established in Downers Grove over eighteen years ago and has had a steady yearly growth ever since. In 1915 the company was organized as an Illinois corporation with \$50,000.00 common and preferred capital stock. About \$10,000.00 in treasury stock remains unsold and this the directors decided to offer for sale in order to provide additional working capital and also take care of factory improvements.

The present officers of the company are: R. E. Bateman, President and Treasurer; E. D. Otto, Vice-President; H. W. Bryce, Secretary and Assistant Manager. These three with E. E. Rogers and H. M. Bateman of Chicago, serve as directors of the company.

In celebration of the prosperous year just completed President Bateman tendered a dinner to the directors at the Hotel La Salle Thursday night.

AMERICAN LEGION TO HOLD REGULAR MEETING MONDAY
