H. Burlingame, Government Special Representative to Speak at American Legion.

Every ex-soldier and sailor who took out government insurance during the world war is urged to attend a meeting next Monday evening, January 19th. The meeting will be held at the club rooms of the American Legion, Belmont and Forest avenues at 8 o'clock.

Mr. H. Burlingame, a special representative of the Government War Risk Insurance Department, has been secured by the local post to talk to the ex-service men on insurance. He will tell how insurance which has been allowed to lapse may be reinstated and will answer any and all questions asked of him.

Compensation Laws.

Mr. Burlingame wishes especially that all ex-service men who are en-

titled to compensation of the government are, be at this meeting. The government knows that many men, wounded or who suffered from disease while in the service, think they are entitled to payments. Those who have a legal claim can find out at this meeting, the proper procedure.
